Proclamation Issued By Gov. Martin

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in the judgement of the State Forester, a menace to life and property due to conditions tending to cause or allow the rapid spread of fires which might occur or because of the inaccessible character of such areas due to the lack of suitable roads, and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following area designated as:

AREA No. R-1—All National Forests in Oregon, except the Siuslaw national forest, and adjacent areas protected by the U. S. Forest service, Sections concerning this section are—

Sections 4, 5, 8 and 9, and E½ T. 38 S., R. 14 W.; T. 39 S., R. 7, 8, 9, 12 and 13 W.; Sections 1, 2, 12 and 13, T. 39 S., R. 14 W.; T. 40 S., R. 7, 8, 9, and 13 W.; T. 41 S., R. 8, 9, 11, and 12 W.; Sections 1 to 3, 10 to 14, 24 and 25, T. 41 S., R. 13 W.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Charles H. Martin, governor of the state of Oregon by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 42-409a, Oregon Code 1935 Supplement, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described area to be unlawful and do hereby close said area and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or conditions.

1. To refrain from smoking while traveling in such areas except on paved or surfaced highways.

2. To secure a permit issued by the forester or a fire warden before building a camp fire other than at improved, designated and posted camp grounds on such areas.

3. To have as a part of his or her equipment when using camp fires, except when traveling as a pedestrian, and for camping at improved, designated and posted camp grounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 1st day of July, 1938, and shall remain in full force and effect until and including the 31st day of December, 1938.

Boy Killed On Caves Highway

Clyde Dunn was killed in an accident on the Caves Highway Wednesday, when the car in which he was riding was in an accident. He was taken to Grants Pass General hospital, but was dead when arriving at the hospital.

Dr. A. N. Collman was called to the scene and after administering first aid to the injured, hurried Dunn to the hospital. The following account of the accident appeared in Wednesday's Grants Pass Courier:

Three college student employees, rushing down the Oregon Caves mountain highway Wednesday morning from the Caves resort to the scene of an accident were wrecked by tire trouble.

Clyde Dunn, about 20, of Portland was critically injured about the head. He served as chateau bellboy. With him were Colmar Lombard, about 22, of Portland, who operates the Caves service station, and Raynor Smith, son of a Methodist minister at Roseburg.

The extent of the injuries of the latter two boys was not definitely stated.

The second accident occurred about one-half mile from the scene of the first, three miles down the mountain side.

A car driven by William Miller, 51 Concord street, San Francisco, was forced over the grade when two cars passed. His son-in-law, Fred Kieser, and Fred's father Charles of Oakland accompanied him. Charles Kieser suffered injuries.

Involved in the accident were four Portland women, Mrs. Alfred Zimmer, Mrs. L. C. Brunner, Mrs. Connie LeVake and Mrs. Dudley Turnaciff.

Happy Camp Trip Very Successful

About 35 automobiles made up the caravan that went to Happy Camp last Sunday on a good will tour of the famous section over the mountain from Illinois Valley. Three commercial clubs sent delegates, Grants Pass, Crescent City, and Cave Junction clubs all had representatives there and attended a meeting that was held to let the people of the Happy Camp district know that those attending were greatly interested in their road problems and wanted to do all in their power to help this great district get some relief from their isolated condition.

The caravan was supposed to meet at O'Brien, but last minute changes had them meet where the Happy Camp road leaves the road to Takilma. On account of the misunderstanding, cars went as they came and it was just as well for considerable dust was eliminated for many cars. All cars were in Happy Camp long before lunch and all the visitors mingled with the people of the Camp and got acquainted. The day was not too hot to be enjoyable and the ride over the mountain, one of the most picturesque in the west, was enjoyed by everyone. Those taking the ride for the first time were thrilled with the marvelous view from the summit of the mountain. The road was in excellent shape and considering that it is a forest road, it proved better than many county and state dirt roads.

The meeting for the visitors was called at 1 o'clock, and all the visitors and a great many of the local people from Happy Camp and surrounding territory attended.

Phil Tolman, superintendent of the Buzzard Hill mine, acted as chairman of the meeting and called it to order, expressing the pleasure of the people of the Happy Camp district had in welcoming the visitors to their city and warmly thanked all of them for coming.

Charles R. Cooley, director of the Chamber of Commerce brought greetings from Grants Pass and said that if Grants Pass could help in any way to get a good road over the mountain, they would do it.

Homer Burton of the Yreka Chamber of Commerce told the gathering that Yreka was just as vitally interested in seeing Happy Camp get a road down the river and over the mountain to Oregon, as any one, and stressed the point several times that Yreka was NOT fighting a road over the mountain into Oregon, but wanted Happy Camp to have this road. He called attention to the fact that the road would serve as a military advantage down the Klamath river and should be built. He also stressed the recreational advantages of a road over the mountain into Oregon. He said the Yreka Chamber of Commerce was solidly behind these roads.

Mr. Cronkrite represented the Crescent City Chamber of Commerce and pledged all the support the bay city could give to help Happy Camp get a new road over the mountain.

A. J. Drews, president of the Illinois Valley Chamber of Commerce said cooperation with all clubs and the people of Happy Camp would bring results and pleaded for support from every club.

A. G. McFarland, president of the Happy Camp Chamber of Commerce thought Mr. Drews' suggestion was a good one and said the Happy Camp Chamber would cooperate with all the other clubs.

J. R. Harvey, secretary of the Grants Pass Chamber told of his early acquaintance of the Happy Camp district, helping build some of the roads that led to mining property. He knows the resources of

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
