the rich district he was visiting and said the road from Happy Camp into the Illinois Valley would give an outlet for the vast mineral and timber wealth of the district. If the district develops transportation must be provided. He said we are out here today to get additional information in regards to tonnage and other data that would add weight to the value of the proposed road.

C. H. Demaray of Grants Pass added the importance of transportation and believed that in the next few years it would be available to the whole district. He stressed the importance of rail, road and harbor development for the whole district.

G. E. Mitchell, supervisor of the Siskiyou National Forest, said that the forest department had a great deal of interest in the proposed road, and said that with the new revised plans of the forest department in helping the district with road construction for other purposes than forest protection, gave added emphasis to the fact that the forest department would help, he thought in the near future, to develop natural resources. He said that Crescent City and Grants Pass were using every facility to help Happy Camp get a new road. He stressed the recreational advantages and how the forest department is helping develop them. This will bring more tourists and ultimately bring new wealth to the district.

Don Cameron, forest service road supervisor, told of the necessity of another grade up the California side of the mountain, the present road grade being too steep. He explained that a new grade with a 6 per cent limit could easily be had with a lower summit grade, and if a tunnel could be constructed, would eliminate about 900 feet of grade, making the road an all year possibility.

James Davis, Siskiyou county district attorney, gave an impassioned talk that took the crowd by storm. Davis is of Indian descent and knows his district thoroughly, and preaches our own philosophy of thought. He said the district could have their road and anything else they wanted if they would go out after it. He told of the great resources of the Happy Camp district and added that the tributaries of the Columbia river didn't have a thing that the tributaries of the Klamath river had. He believes the roads necessary to the development of Happy Camp would soon be built. Davis made a great political speech, and mixed it in with a great talk about the resources of Happy Camp. He said at the conclusion to start going out after the road and don't stop, keep going.

Phil Snort was called on and made a fine little talk to those present.

Judge Brown of Happy Camp made a hit with a short talk. The judge is well liked in Happy Camp.

The mineral resources of this great district are greatly handicapped without transportation, and when some means of getting the rich ore out of the district is provided, this camp will become one of the great mining centers of the United States, and this time is not far off.

The meeting was a grand success and gave the people of Happy Camp added ammunition to carry on and fight for their transportation needs. All attending the meeting gave their approval of the road necessity.

Ted Athey spoke for a minute at the end of the meeting and told of the Miners' Jubilee in Cave Junction and invited all of Happy Camp over to this great celebration.

After the meeting, the caravan started back home, some leaving immediately and others lingering to talk over the problems of the Camp and see what could be done to help.

All in all the caravan was a huge success and great importance is attached to the fact that near future developments will start in helping these people get an all-year road over the mountain into the Illinois Valley and onto the Redwoods highway where they have an outlet, both to a good market and harbor facilities for their minerals and timber wealth.

"Aside from the low cost factor, tests have proved that these two colors make the best combination for visibility, and should be an aid in safer driving," Snell stated.

The size and general make-up of the plates, including the type of figures and letters, will remain the same as in the past.
