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Ladino Crop Double Of Last Year

A 1938 ladino clover seed crop for Josephine county that will be almost double that of last year was estimated this week by County Agent O. K. Beals after a 10-day annual inspection by E. R. Jackson, farm crop extension specialist from Oregon State college.

This year's crop will produce an estimated 89,405 pounds of seed, as compared with 50,000 for 1937. The estimate for 1937 was 55,000 pounds.

Virtually the entire crop has already been sold, and at excellent prices, by the Josephine Growers Cooperative association, it has been reported. The average price to growers will be 65 cents for blue tag seed, 60 cents for red tag, and 55 cents for yellow tag, approximately the same prices as were paid last year. The Northrup King company purchased the bulk of the crop.

Mr. Beals estimated that the county's total income from the seed would be about \$55,000, but the figure does not give a true picture of the harvest's profitability. Ladino clover hay cut on the same 1,000 acres will yield three tons to the acre, or \$30,000 worth, and some \$5,000 more for pasturing will be obtained.

A total of 1,088½ acres, belonging to 217 growers, were checked for certification by Jackson. Of this, 931 acres received blue tags, certifying that the seed is now growing has less than one per cent of white clover mixed with it.

Red tags went to 71¾ acres, denoting less than two per cent of white clover, and 56½ acres received yellow tags, or less than 10 per cent of white clover. Only 29 acres were rejected for certification as having over 19 per cent white clover.

Growers are asked to remember, however, that the final grade on seed is based on requirements for that grade, and is determined by the purity inspection made at harvest time. To obtain blue tag rating, the seed must be 99 per cent pure, having less than one per cent weed seeds and inert matter, and only a little more than 50 per cent of the crop is expected to pass blue tag qualifications at that time.

Bumblebees are probably the principal agents responsible for this summer's bumper crop, Mr. Beals said. Apparently as a result of this year's mild winter, bumblebees in exceptionally large numbers have been seen in the fields, and their fertilizing efforts among the blossoms have been a great help.

An increase in acreage, from 930 to 1,085, is also responsible in a small part.
