Government to Help Tourists See the West

Having spent several million of dollars in creating Treasure Island, backed up by an appropriation of \$1,500,000 for a federal exhibit at the Golden Gate International Exposition on San Francisco bay, Uncle Sam now is pitching in to help bring people to the 1939 World's Fair of the West, and to encourage them to "See All the West in '39."

Through the newly organized United States Travel Bureau, operated by the National Park Service, the federal government is preparing to lend a helping hand to Americans who believe in seeing America first.

It marks the first time that our government has gone in for tourist promotion on a broad scale, although many European nations have had government travel bureaus for many years.

While the new Travel Bureau was not organized especially to assist the Golden Gate International Exposition, its activities in the west have been speeded up by reason of the World's Fair.

Said J. R. Anderson supervisor of the New York office of the bureau: "We have rushed our plans for a Western office in order to assist the people of the Western state in making their Golden Gate International Exposition a success. Eastern people will want to see the scenic attractions of the West as well as the Exposition, and we believe that we can help in this big travel program."

That "big travel program" is the coordinated Western states travel promotion plan launched by the Exposition more than a year ago, in which the western states, railroads, travel agencies and others interested in tourist promotion have been brought together in a major effort to attract visitors to all the West.

It is encouraging to learn that the government is joining this movement to make 1939 the greatest travel year in Western history.

Ground Broken for Redwood Empire Bldg.

Friday, September 2 marked a momentous occasion in the history of the Redwood Empire counties—the formal ground-breaking for the Redwood Empire building on Treasure Island, in which notables from every part of the world will be welcomed during the exposition year.

Preliminary arrangements for the ceremonial were made by the Redwood Empire Exposition Commission, the California State Exposition Commission and the Redwood Empire association. It embodied many colorful features, typifying the allure of the Redwood Empire, America's newest natural playground.

Completed drawings from the architects boards indicate that the Redwood Empire building, which will be in the form of a typical Redwood forest lodge, will be one of the outstanding edifices on Treasure Island.

Aviation Meeting to Be Held in Medford

Private fliers and fixed base operators will play an important part in the program of the fifth Northwest Aviation Planning Council to be held at Medford, Oregon, on September 16th and 17th, it was announced by A. H. Banwell, program chairman.

A certain amount of time has been set aside in the two-day program for a discussion of the problems of private flying, and questions such as Department of Commerce regulation and legal aspects of private flying, State Aeronautic Boards and regulations of private fliers, the future for private fliers and recommendations for simplified regulations will be included in the program.

At previous Council meetings, little time has been devoted to the question of the problems of the fixed base operator. For that reason, fixed base operators will be afforded an opportunity to discuss their problems at the Medford meeting, Banwell stated.

A representative of the recently formed Civil Aeronautics Authority will attend the Council meeting, as will Major General Oscar Westover, Chief of the United States Air Corps, and other prominent aviation authorities from all over the United States.

National defense, airports, feeder lines, airplane manufacturers and amateur aircraft building are but a few of the subjects which will be covered at the meeting.
