Over on the Redwood highway, that traverses the Rough-and-Ready flat from O'Brien to Cave City, are homes established, modern ones with modern conveniences, and others in the course of construction and others contemplated. I have in mind such homes as A. A. Johnson's, Dr. Brown's, the Opple home that is fast nearing completion, to say nothing of roadside camps like Balcke's, Ye Rustic and Cumfy Camp.
I have long been asked to boost for this valley and that I am most willing to do, but I must do it my way, and not the way of the real estate dealers. I shall not boost this valley as an agricultural valley, nor as a place to get rich in, but I will boost it as an ideal valley to live in for those who have made their pile and wish to retire from business. There are thousands of them thruout the United States, and we have room for a few thousand of them. They can build homes on our poorest lands, wonderful homes, and those of us who have good farm land will find a market with them for what we raise. I shall continue these thoughts in a later letter.

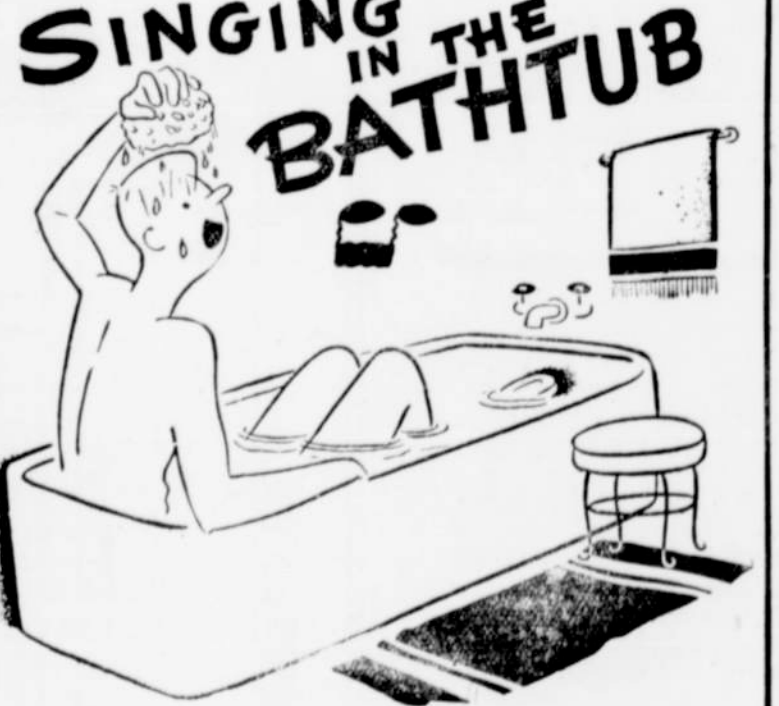
