THE NEW ARMISTICE

Twenty years ago tomorrow the guns were silenced, bayonets were returned to their sheathes and a weary, battered world began to plan for peace.

"Bigger and better" was the slogan of those days, and because size was so much easier to see than quality, we sometimes neglected the second half of the slogan in our absorption with the first.

That kind of peace could not last. Its foundations cracked under the shelling of the stock market drop and the whole structure tumbled before the heavy barrage of shrinking markets, falling prices and unemployment. We are in the midst of a world war more devastating, more encompassing than that in which we struggled in 1918. Not only are we uniting efforts to rout a common enemy, but each of us is also engaged in a personal hand-to-hand battle with that enemy's cohorts.

Slowly, almost imperceptibly, we are gaining ground, moving forward our front line of defense. Not yet can we allow the smoking cannon to cool nor lean wearily on our rifles. But another Armistice is not far distant.

And when that is signed, upon terms of the unconditional surrender of Depression or Recession, we will have conquered not only the enemy, but let us hope, ourselves. And in that new and better peace may we, in the hard-won knowledge of the sound sense, idealism, courage, and good humor of the American people, build, not bigger, but better structures of civilization.
