IRRIGATION POSSIBILITIES

It has been announced by the Farm Security Administration that 20 farmers have qualified for loans to establish pumping units for irrigation in the valley. There has not been a single one turned down up to the present time.

This is good news for the agricultural development of this section. Several hundred additional acres will be put into cultivation and irrigated that are not now being utilized, and the more acreage planted, the greater return to the farmers.

This valley is particularly adapted to some crops that thrive here and a bountiful yield results, and with study and irrigation, this section can become the best agricultural section in southern Oregon. It has the possibilities, and only needs a little experimentation and water on the ground to do the trick.

There is plenty of good farming land still available in the valley and we could easily take care of several hundred more farmers, but we need FARMERS, not city dudes—Farmers who know it takes hard work to make a farm pay dividends—Farmers who are not afraid of hard work and long hours in order to get ahead. To these sturdy men, there is a real opportunity awaiting them here.

5-County Grange Meet Postponed until Epring

Postponement of the five-county Grange agricultural conference which was scheduled for Grants Pass on Friday, December 2, was made known last week in a letter from Morton Tompkins, state Grange agricultural committee chairman, to County Agent O. K. Beals.

The conference will instead be held during March or April, Mr. Tompkins said, with Grange committees of Josephine, Jackson, Klamath Falls, Curry and Coos counties participating.

A meeting of Josephine county's Grange agricultural committee was held Tuesday, December 6 in the county agent's office in the court house. Weed control, a cooperative bull association, and the 1939 Grange program were discussed.

No Car Licenses to Be Taken Before 15th

No applications for 1939 automobile licenses plates can be received at the sheriff's office until after December 15, Miss Eleanor McQuitty, motor vehicle deputy, said last Tuesday in the Courier.

After that time, passenger car owners may bring in their car registration slips and \$5 to the sheriff's office and their new plates will later be mailed to them from the secretary of state's office. Truck and trailer owners may procure licenses in the same manner but with varying license fees.

An additional 25 cents is charged for obtaining the licenses through the sheriff's office.
