In the meantime we have one of the best doctors in the state, and the only handicap we are under is the fact that he cannot write a prescription. Other than that he does nearly everything a registered M. D. could do.

If the county court would release itself from the State Medical society, or whatever it is called, and use its own initiative in the dispensation of medical service, the county would be better off. If this was done, it could be arranged to have a registered M. D. and a nurse make a regular visit to the valley every week and take care of cases that perhaps are otherwise neglected.
