OFF IN THE CORNER WITH PHIL SNORT

In resuming the subject of wild life destruction, and its causes, I will return to the forests of Wisconsin where I grew up and where when I was very small the forests were almost unbroken and game of every description was abundant. What happened there was happening where every forest grew and railroads found their way among them; hence the reason that I stated, in a former letter, that railroads were the greatest agents of wild life destruction. These roads not only drained our forests of its finest timber, but they made these same forests easily accessible to "market" hunters who shipped their spoils over them to the Milwaukee and Chicago markets, mostly.

When I was a boy of 6 or 7, boys of about my age and I would make it a point to be at the depot about train time, and during falls and winters, there were scarcely any days that the depot platform was not covered with deer, and sometimes a bear or two, tagged for the Chicago markets; also there were many small game shipped, such as rabbits, partridges, quail and squirrels. Besides the market hunters there were hosts of trappers, so with the disappearance of our forests the wild life they sheltered disappeared also, our small streams dwindled down to almost nothing; small streams where I fished as a boy, where we used to take off our pants, wade into the pools and muddy up the water until the fish would come to the top dying or dead, and we would scoop them out with our hands, carry them home for mother, Aunt Nancy, Aunt Sarah or grandmother to fry for us. Many a painful have we taken in this way, yet there are those of our Illinois Valley who claim that muddy water does not harm fish; why not be truthful? Looking back on those boyhood days how well do I remember those streams—tributaries of the Baraboo river with its south, middle and north forks with their minor streams; how well do I remember when I first swam across the Baraboo, near our little town. The swim I made was about 75 feet. I was back there in 1918 and there were few places but what I could jump across. The small streams where I used to fish were all "dry-runs" save in fall and spring floods. Great gulches cut in the farm lands and people fighting erosion with willow and alder plantings, and in many other ways. The mighty forests that used to hold the rainfall all gone, sacrificed to the railroads, sacrificed to man's greed for gold.

We have our forests here that cover mountains that are good for nothing but the flora that grows upon them, flora that will feed and shelter millions of fauna; let us keep the flora and protect the fast disappearing fauna; let us give nature a chance and do away with science that in any way interferes with it—science that interferes with the Creator's plans, plans that no human agency can improve.
