The story of "Men With Wings," revolves about the experiences of three young people, taking them from the days of their childhood, when the Wrights made their first flight, through the World War period, the fabulous boom days of the Coolidge Era, and finally down to the present time, when aviation stands at the crossroads. Miss Campbell, the daughter of an early aviation enthusiast who dies while attempting to fly, devotes her life to flying and to her two closest friends, Millan, a hardworking plane designer, and MacMurray, a roistering aviator.

In love with both men, Miss Campbell must make her choice between the dare-devil and romantic MacMurray and the dependable and far-visioned Millan. She makes her decision in a startling climax which helps change the future course of aviation history.

Gorgeous Technicolor brings out the drama and romance of the picture far better than any mere black-and-white could do. Although the picture is great by itself, the use of color makes it even greater. Every one who has ever thrilled to the drone of a plane overhead or been entranced by a silver streak shooting down a runway—and who has not,—will want to see this epic of the air.
