Ground Squirrels To Be Poisoned

Ground squirrels will be poisoned over areas aggregating 1800 acres in the Siskiyou national forest. Work will be begun by members of the Gasquet CCC camp under the supervision of the Biological Survey Wednesday, June 14th according to information received from the county agent's office. Most of the land to be covered is in the Illinois valley.

Harry Stokes, government trapper will be in direct charge of the operations. Illinois valley farmers are urged to place poison for squirrels on their own land at the same time by O. K. Beals, county agent. Good results may be expected from applications at this time of year, he stated. Harry Stokes will not be available for general predatory animal control work until after June 25.

Poisoned grain prepared under the supervision of the Biological Survey may be purchased at cost at the county agent's office or at the following places: Mack's Feed and Seed store, Grants Pass Feed and Seed, Star Seed and Grocery, Tardy's Seeds and Feeds and Holland store from Harry Floyd.
