Feather river in Northern California, reported that the magnets came up with the black sand sticking to them like quills on a porcupine, and that the samples averaged \$92.50 a ton.

Mr. Parker estimate 650 tons daily of the sand passing down the Feather river, carrying in addition to the gold values, 72 per cent iron.

"Suppose a giant electric magnet placed in the stream of sufficient size and power to recover 300 tons of magnetic black sand a day, its electricity generated by the water power of the river. What would the mining cost be," he asked?

The following letter from the Second Assistant Postmaster General is of public interest because of the extended correspondence which has been carried on for more than a year — even before the discontinuance of the Star route delivery. In my letter of March 31st to which Mr. O'Connell is replying I stated the case again.

My Dear Doctor Brown:

Further reference is made to your letter of March 31st, 1939, in which you requested the establishment of a supplemental star route for box service between Kerby, Oregon, and Quarantine Station, California.

This matter was referred to our field officials for investigation, and the report received indicates that since extension of the rural route from Kerby and omission of box delivery and collection service on the Gold Beach-Grants Pass star route, mails addressed to Cave Junction have not been properly handled.

Instructions have been issued for the rural carrier out of Kerby to stop at Cave Junction for any mail addressed to box patrons between O'Brien and Cave Junction, so that he may deliver such mail to the box patrons the same day it is received at Cave Junction; and outgoing mail placed in the boxes will be delivered at Cave Junction in time to connect the northbound trip of the Gold Beach-Grants Pass star route the same day.

It is believed, therefore, that the rural service will provide adequate mail facilities for the families involved; and it is not apparent wherein it is necessary to establish an additional star route for box service between Kerby and Quarantine station.
