Special Federal Fire Laws Start July 1st

Special federal fire laws to safeguard the forests from fire during the hazardous summer months become effective on July first. These special regulations pertain to the requirement of a campfire permit, except at designated forest camps; to no smoking while traveling; and to the requirement of an ax, shovel and water bucket on all camping trips.

The regulations that come into effect July first are:

1—Requirement of a campfire permit before building a camp fire on any national forest land, except at designated forest camps. The designated camp grounds in the Illinois Valley are the Gray-back forest camp, the Store Gulch forest camp, and the Elk Valley forest camp.

2—No smoking will be permitted while traveling, except on a two-way surfaced road.

3—An axe, bucket, and shovel will be required for each party camping on the national forest except parties that pack in on their back.

Attention is called to the year long regulation, which prohibits the use of fireworks within the national forests at any time. This regulation also applies to the designated forest camp grounds.

Camp fire permits may be obtained at the Redwood Ranger station, Cave Junction; Cedar Guard station on the Caves highway; the Store Gulch G. S. on the Illinois river road; and at the several lookout stations.

Vegetable Gardens Are Inspected By Group

Four well-planned farm vegetable gardens were visited by 40 interested enrollees in the county-wide garden project being conducted by County Agent O. K. Beals and Home Demonstration Agent, Nola A. Welch. O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist, accompanied the tour and demonstrated the use of dusting and spraying equipment for garden insects.

On an area of 20,000 square feet, A. W. Burton, Jenkins avenue, had 22 varieties garden vegetables in addition to small fruits and fruit trees. In 1938 Mr. Burton reported this area had produced the following amounts of produce in addition to supplying the family needs of fresh vegetables and fruit.

Produce sold \$ 73.00
Produce canned 115.30

Total \$188.30

It was pointed out here that moderate irrigation and shallow cultivation is advisable.

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Kemp of Wilderville explained that by the addition of forest leaves, barnyard manure, and commercial fertilizer, the soil in their family garden had improved to the point that now the small area of approximately 15,000 square feet supplied all of their needs for vegetables.
