Lone Passenger Escaped Serious Injury Sunday

Gunnar Sondeno, plant quarantine inspector for the California State Department of Agriculture miraculously escaped serious injury when his car overturned on the Caves highway near Cave Junction.

The accident happened at 3:00 p. m. Sunday afternoon when Inspector Sondeno was returning alone from a picnic near Oregon Caves highway. While traveling at a speed of 45 miles per hour around a slight curve the car was forced to the right side of the road when the wheels failed to make traction caused by loose sand on the pavement. Trying to straighten the car back on the highway according to Mr. Sondeno, he cramped the wheels to such an extent that the car hit solid pavement again the front wheels locked causing the car to roll out of control on left side of the road down a small embankment. The car made a complete loop and rolled over either once or twice coming to a stop on its left side facing the opposite direction that the car was originally traveling.

Mr. Sondeno crawled from the wreckage with only slight bruises and a torn shirt. After shaking the sand from his eyes and hair he said: "My car is covered by insurance, but I did hate to ruin a perfectly good shirt." Gunnar Sondeno has parents living in Turlock, California.
