

State Is Divided In 6 Districts

Oregon has been divided into six census districts for the 1940 census.

Early this month area managers appointed in November by the census bureau after an intensive training course in Washington, will call candidates for district supervisors to area headquarters to be schooled in census taking. Those making the best showing will be appointed supervisors.

The districts in turn will be divided into enumeration districts, and it will be 143,000 enumerators who will ask most of the questions in next year's census. Except for those taking the business census in January, however, most of the enumerators will not be named until next spring.

Census bureau officials announced these districts and headquarters in Oregon:

District 1, Salem—Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill, Polk, Marion and Clackamas counties.

ment of Mines, this deposit appears to be worthy of exploration and development. The index of mineral resources at Ottawa, which has been kept fully up to date since the last war, contains full particulars of many chromite mines, prospects and occurrences situated in all parts of the Dominion. From several of these, additional supplies of chrome ore could speedily be obtained.

In the United States in the last World War, it was found possible to increase local production of chromite ore from 3,300 tons in 1915 to 83,000 tons in 1918. Since the outbreak of the present war and the rapid rise in the price, production of chrome ore in the United States has once again increased, and the search for new deposits stimulated. It will be a long time, however, before the American demand of between 500,000 - 600,000 tons annually can be satisfied from American sources.

While the increasing peace time uses of chromium in automobile engine valves, in gears of all kinds, and in stainless steel, etc., make it important in industry, the advent of war makes a large supply of ore a vital necessity. As an alloy in gun-barrels, armour-plate, armour-piercing projectiles and high-speed steel tools used in munition-making, it is indispensable in war-time. Unlike nickel, however, its price is not stabilized or controlled. Over the past 25 years, the price, responsive to supply and demand, has been correspondingly erratic. In the present war, unless sufficient shipping bottoms can be provided without difficulty and delay, the new wartime demand for chrome ore will likely cause spectacular price performances. The only way of avoiding runaway prices is either through some form of government rationing, or a speedy increase in production in Canada, the United States, or in the Islands, like Cuba, adjacent to this continent.

In Canada, in particular, an increase in the production of chrome ore is desirable. A new plant for the reduction of chrome ore, capable of utilizing ore of less than 50 per cent oxide content, has just been put into production at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. Now that the overseas supplies of chrome ore are curtailed or cut off, any local producers of chrome ore, especially in Ontario, would find here a ready and acceptable market for their output. The relief thereby afforded to the already over-taxed shipping resources on the high seas, would constitute a most valuable and timely contribution to the British war effort.

radio tuning in on the program when the broadcast opened.

The first few minutes of the broadcast permitted the radio compass station at Point Reyes, California, to check the KUIN frequency and it was found to be 6 cycles above its 1310 kilocycle assigned wave. Immediately adjustments brought the carrier wave precisely on the 1310 K. C. channel. The accuracy of setting and radiation resulting were considered excellent since no precise tests have yet been made to establish the exact elevation at which the transmitter lead will make its permanent contact with the 165-foot ground-base transmission tower.

Alvor Olson, chief engineer of Eureka radio station KIEM, set up the KUIN transmitter, the only new Western Electric transmitter in Oregon, and conducted the tests, making the second announcement over the station. Others present in the KUIN control room were William B. Smullin of Eureka, secretary-treasurer of the Southern Oregon Broadcasting Co., John Bauriedel, manager of KUIN; Edward A. Malone, KUIN technician; and Earle E. Voorhies. Each made subsequent announcements.

The program was transcription music, the first numbers played being from standard broadcast lateral-cut transcriptions. Later numbers were from the World Broadcasting System on special high-fidelity vertical-cut transcriptions. Station KUIN is a member of the World Broadcasting System.

Quality of the first broadcast was evident from calls received at KUIN from listeners, but will be improved as the transcription tables, control console, voice amplifiers and transmitter are lined up and balanced permanently. The transmitter was radiating its assigned 100 watts, but modulation

was only 60 to 70 per cent and was somewhat off balance, distorting the wave form and affecting tone fidelity.

Carpenters and electricians are continuing work on the new studio building. Temporary wiring is still in use inside and the interior finish is not yet complete. The tower must be painted and the lighting completed and this will be done immediately.

KUIN is expected to start regular programs in the very near future and the valley radio fans will have an opportunity to receive radio receptions any time of the day when this station gets into action.
