

Portlander Seeks Office At Primaries

Ralph H. Cake, prominent Portland civic leader, party worker and businessman, filed late yesterday with Secretary of State Earl Snell

for the office of Republican national committeeman. Cake who is a native of Port-

land where he was born in 1891 absorbed Republican doctrine under the tutoring of his father, the late Judge W. M. Cake, while attending Portland grade and high schools and the University of Oregon where he graduated in 1913. He finished his education by taking law at Harvard and returned to Oregon to join his father's firm. In school he joined the Phi Gamma Delta which he has since served as national officer. He is a past president of the University of Oregon Alumni association. He is a member of numerous fraternal and civic organizations and was president of the highly successful 1938 Rose Festival.

Cake was married in 1916 to Gretchen (Sherwood) Coquille and they have two children, Martha and Ralph, Jr.

Since the death of his father Cake has been associated in law practise with Lamar Toozee and Nicholas Jauregui. He is also president of the Equitable Savings and Loan association. His extensive legal contacts require frequent trips east and has resulted in making political contacts there which his friends feel can be of value to Oregon. Always active in local politics Cake was chairman of the finance committee for the recent Lincoln Day program in Portland which featured Thomas Dewey.

Scaled bids, marked outside "Bid for Timber," and addressed to the Chief Forester, O. and C. Administration, 416 Custom House, Portland, Oregon, will be received until 10:30 a. m., Pacific Time, March 5, 1940, for the purchase of timber upon tracts hereinafter described; the cutting and removal of the timber to be carried out in accordance with the forest practice rules approved on July 7, 1938 by the Secretary of the Interior. Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet, board measure, that will be paid for each species or class of timber. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit. The deposit must be in the form of a certified check on a solvent National Bank and in favor of the Chief Forester of the O. and C. Administration. The amount of the deposit will be computed at the rate of at least 20 per cent of the first \$1000 of any estimated stumpage value; at least 10 per cent of the next \$9000 of any estimated stumpage value and at least 5 per cent of any additional estimated stumpage value in excess of \$10,000 and up to \$25,000 in amount. The deposit of any successful bidder will be credited as a first installment in the payment for the timber. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned upon the award of the bid. A bond on all sales will be required in an amount computed at the rate of at least 20 per cent of the first \$10,000 of the bid, plus 10 per cent of any additional amount of the bid in excess of \$10,000. Payment for timber will be required in advance of cutting, payment in full at the time of filing the contract being required in sales amounting to \$2500 or less. In larger sales, payment may be made in a number of installments scheduled to keep pace with the rate of timber cutting and payable upon demand from the Chief Forester. The successful bidder in each sale exceeding \$5000 in amount will be required, prior to the approval of the contract covering such sale, to furnish a sworn financial statement showing ability to fulfill the terms of the contract. For copies of the form of proposal, form of contract and bond, and other information, application should be made to the Chief Forester, O. and C. Administration, Portland, Oregon.

The timber volumes, given in the following appraisals, are estimated and may be more or less than the amounts stated. Living cull trees and young timber less than merchantable size are reserved from cutting.

To the People of Jackson and Josephine Counties, Greetings:
Nearly a year ago I openly announced my intention of seeking nomination and election to the office of Circuit Judge for the First Judicial District, comprising Jackson and Josephine Counties. This fact became quite generally known in both counties long prior to the 6th day of the present month, at which time I filed my formal Declaration with the Secretary of State, I having therefore received considerable encouragement from many people residing throughout the District who, believing me qualified for this office, voluntarily assured me of their active support of my candidacy.

I am not unmindful of the tremendously important duties and responsibilities connected with such office, and I take this opportunity of thanking my friends for their kindly interest and consideration in me, as such confidence is further shown by the very large majority of votes received by me in my nomination and election as District Attorney for Jackson County in 1936, which term will expire in January 1941.

I sincerely hope that my untiring efforts to properly perform my duties as District Attorney have met with such general approval that you, as voters, will not hesitate to again express your continued faith and confidence in me by nominating and electing me as your next Circuit Judge. I sincerely believe that I can render a valuable service in that position, and I openly covet this Honor as a fitting climax to my many years of active service as an attorney and citizen.

However, I lay no claim to being either a super-man, diplomat nor politician, but rather to that of being a plain, outspoken American, who does not fear to entertain and express an honest opinion on any subject having to do with the best interests of our people and Government, be the issue local, state or national. At the same time I freely and gladly concede and accord like rights and privileges to every other American citizen.

I conscientiously feel that my THIRTY-EIGHT YEARS of active law practice, with its incident business experiences, has NECESSARILY brought me into close touch with practically every phase of personal, business and professional life, and has thoroughly acquainted me with the problems confronting the people of this District, thereby tending directly to fit and qualify me, both in EXPERIENCE and TEMPERAMENT, for the office of Circuit Judge. If I felt otherwise, I WOULD NOT SEEK THIS HONOR.

Owing to the exacting duties of my office as District Attorney I will, of course, be prevented from making many personal contacts in carrying out my campaign, as my time will not permit of so doing. I do feel, however, that every voter in this District is justly entitled to have, and in fact, should demand, a clear, concise and honest statement from each candidate, setting up the qualifications which he claims to possess entitling him to the support of the electorate. This applies with special force to the office of Circuit Judge, with its incident powers and responsibilities.

I will, therefore, from time to time, each month, prior to the election, furnish other written statements as to my further qualifications for the office to which I aspire. In the meantime, should you desire so to do, I will welcome your careful personal investigation of my record as an attorney and citizen.

In closing this, my first published statement, I promise the people of this District that if I am nominated and elected as your next Circuit Judge I will never violate nor betray the confidence thus reposed in me, nor forfeit the Honor bestowed upon me by the voters of this District.

I therefore ask that you kindly keep me in mind pending further statements of the reasons why I feel that I am qualified for the office of Circuit Judge. These statements are published for the purpose only of assisting you in reaching a correct conclusion as to whom, among the candidates, is best suited to properly perform the important duties of such office.
