### WILD ATLANTIC

rock-on-the-Clyde, Scotland, the ports of New York and London, and the wild reaches of the North Atlantic as seen from the decks of two ships, Lloyd set a host of assistants and special researchers to work to make it possible to construct authentic sets.

With material gathered from sources in the four corners of the earth, Lloyd's technicians recreated Castle Garden (the Battery) along the shore line of the outer harbor of San Pedro, California, peopled it ready for the arrival of the Dog Star, a full-sized paddle-wheel steamer.

Just as much care was taken in reproducing the old London docks. An unbroken stretch of dock six hundred feet long was found on the waterfront near Wilmington. Tons of loose dirt were dumped on the wharf, watered to create the impression of a mud surface such as old prints of London docks disclose. Then buildings were erected in early nineteenth century style.

Alongside the wharf sailors berthed two period ships, in themselves fine examples of movie re-
