I have a daughter in high school and a son in junior high school. Am now engaged in part-time farming on my 12-acre farm, corner Redwood highway and Leonard road. Am also employed part time at the Owl Drug store in Grants Pass. Each year, for the past four years, I have worked with the Josephine County Agricultural Conservation Association. This work consists of checking farms in the county. Last year I, with two assistants, measured and mapped every acre of wheat that was signed up on this program.

My experience with this program has enabled me to become personally acquainted with the farmer and his tax problem and my work in the drug store has acquainted me with the city resident and his tax situation.

I favor a revaluation of all property and business establishments and, if elected, shall endeavor to obtain a copy of the aerial pictures of the county that are being made by the army engineers. These pictures show each field on every farm accurately mapped to scale and their use will eliminate all guess work as to how many acres we have in actual use.

I am a God-fearing Christian and a member in good standing of the Free Methodist church. I am free from any financial indebtedness. I do not use liquor or tobacco, neither will I participate in anything that would bring reproach upon this office. I do not favor members of the same family working in the same office.

ulation and lead past far more attractive scenery.

Commissioner John Valen's efforts toward Happy Camp road were reviewed, including his donation of right-of-way. Valen said his efforts now are bent toward improving the Hays hill sector of the Redwood highway and recounted recent developments.

He read a letter from State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock which gave as Baldock's opinion that a recent fatal CCC truck accident could not be blamed upon the road condition, but which at the same time expressed the hope that eventually—and after Pacific highway work—that the Redwood highway would be made standard.

Commissioner McElligott read a letter from T. J. Jones of the Klamath national forest in which Jones indicated that the Happy Camp road could not be constructed under a \$5,000-per-mile limit.

But J. R. Harvey, in citing statistics of the importance of the Happy Camp region to Crescent City and the Illinois and Rogue valleys, pointed out that the \$5,000 limit is often exceeded by use of CCC labor. He gave the Galice road extension as an example which cost as much as \$16,000 for a mile.
