ITEMS OF INTEREST TO TOWNSENDITES

April 3—House of Representatives—The petition to discharge the Townsend bill and bring it on the floor of the house was placed on the desk of the clerk of the house for signatures at noon, April 3. One hour before Congress adjourned, 70 Representatives had attached their names to our petition. Seventy signatures the first day; 218 needed.

Florida's Representative Joe Hendricks was the first to sign. Florida's Lex Green was second; 250 pound Pat Cannon of Florida was third in line, but Gerald Landis of Indiana good-naturedly pushed him aside and won third position. The Florida delegation had determined to take all of the first positions.

RESTAURANTS CAN'T CHISEL ON CREAM

The law requires that coffee cream served in restaurants and other eating places must contain at least 18 per cent butterfat, unless a sign to the contrary is displayed, warns A. W. Metzger, chief of the state department of agriculture division of foods and dairies. Inspectors have been instructed to check eating places to see that there is complete compliance with this law.

KERBY GRADE SCHOOL NEWS

A group of the 7th and 8th grade pupils visited the Illinois Valley News office Thursday. Mr. Athey, editor, explained and demonstrated the operation of the Linotype machine and the printing equipment in the plant.

The junior class of the high school will have a refreshment booth at the Sports Day in Kerby April 26th. It is possible that the grade school will have one also since the Valley Teachers' association authorized a maximum of two. No other community or school has requested one yet.

Behind the fairly steady pitching of Dean Tyceer the Grade school defeated Rocky Dale in a soft ball game Friday. The game was featured by several double plays and a home run by Charles Smith with the bases full for Kerby. The Holton Creek diamond is in excellent condition. The game was a nine-inning affair instead of the usual seven. Rocky Dale brought the score close in the closing innings when relief pitcher Smith lost control. The score was 18 to 14.

SISKIYOU FOREST PLANTS TREES

Ten forest guards, under the supervision of District Ranger Boyd L. Rasmussen, have just completed the planting of 52,000 Port Orford cedar trees on lands donated to the Forest Service by the Coos Bay Lumber company and located on Eden Ridge, announced Supervisor Edward P. Cliff.

This is the largest number of trees planted on the Siskiyou National Forest in any one season, and the largest number of Port Orford cedar trees planted by the Forest Service in the northwest region, Cliff stated. Most of the trees are planted on lands devoid of natural reproduction, but because of the high stumpage value of Port Orford cedar, some of the trees were used to "sweeten" fir reproduction of medium density so

as to increase the ultimate value of the mature forest.

In addition to the planting of the trees, some test plots were planted with poisoned Douglas fir seed to determine if reproduction can be established by seeding. The seeds were poisoned to destroy the rodents which if present in relatively large numbers, are destructive to seed plantations. If these plots prove successful, more planting will be done with poisoned seed so as to speed up reforestation, which is curtailed at the present time by nursery limitations. Because the seeds are buried, no damage is anticipated to upland birds, Cliff stated.

Legion Auxiliary Plans Annual Poppy Dance

The American Legion Auxiliary wishes to express their thanks to the Rebeccas for postponing the dance which they had planned for May 25. This is the date set for the National sale of poppies, being the last Saturday before Memorial Day. These poppies are made by men confined in hospitals, and the entire proceeds are used for them and their families, as they cannot draw compensation while hospitalized.
