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Poppies Are Made By Veterans

The President of the United States received his memorial poppy from the hands of the national president of the American Legion Auxiliary when Mrs. William Corwith visited the White House on April 10. President Roosevelt received the poppy graciously, expressing his appreciation of the meaning of the little red flower. Placing it in his button hole, he discussed with Mrs. Corwith the conditions of the disabled veterans and their need for the occupation the poppy-making gives them. He voiced the hope that the observance of Poppy Day this year, May 25, would achieve its purpose of honoring the World War dead and aiding the disabled and dependents.

DO YOU KNOW—That the memorial poppies are made of red crepe paper, by hand, by disabled veterans in more than 50 hospitals and poppy workrooms in 40 states, and that the workers receive pay for each poppy made, the material being furnished free by the department in whose territory the hospital is located?

That more than 10,000,000 poppies made by disabled veterans are sold on the streets under the supervision of the American Legion Auxiliary on the Saturday preceding Memorial Day, by volunteer workers who receive no compensation?

That the public is given an opportunity each year to help the great work of the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary, as well as opportunity to pay tribute to all who died in service, by wearing a poppy on Poppy Day?

MRS E. L. COOVERT PASSES SUDDENLY

Many residents of the valley were shocked to learn of the sudden death of Mrs. Eda Lenora Athey Coovert last Saturday noon in Portland from a heart attack.

About three weeks ago Ted and Mrs. M. C. Athey took Mrs. Coovert to Portland where she could have better attention and care, as she was not in the best of health, but nothing serious was anticipated. Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Athey left for Portland last Saturday morning expecting to see Mrs. Coovert rapidly gaining in health. She passed away while they were on the road to Portland and did not know of her sudden death until they arrived there.

Mrs. Coovert was 68 years old. She had been a supervisor in music in the Portland schools for 20 years, and then five years in a grade school teaching music. She came to the Illinois Valley a little over two years ago.

She leaves a son, Elmo C. Coovert of Portland and two brothers, L. E. (Ted) and Mornay C. Athey of Cave Junction. Ted took the night train for Portland Monday for the funeral which was held Tuesday morning in the Portland Crematorium. He returned home Tuesday night with Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Athey.

Mrs. Coovert was the daughter of M. C. Athey senior, who was the third white child born in the Oregon Territory.

R. W. CROSS

The passing of R. W. Cross, father of Mrs. C. C. Babcock, came as a severe shock to the family. Preparing to make a visit to Oregon the next week, he was stricken with a heart attack and died suddenly. "Dad" Cross, as he was called by all who knew him, formerly made his home here, but was called to Minnesota to live with his widowed sister. He is survived by his son, H. J. Cross of Palo Alto, California, his daughter Mrs. C. C. Babcock of this city and one sister, Mrs. Anna Hay of Fairmont, Minnesota. Burial was made at Fairmont, Minnesota.
