NO PASSING ZONES

center line, he is warned that it is not safe to cross to the left side of the highway for the purpose of passing another vehicle traveling in the same direction. However, if the white line is on the opposite or left-hand side of the center line and the road is clear and visible for a sufficient distance ahead, the center line may be crossed to pass the vehicle ahead. The driver needs to remember only one thing

—he should not pass an overtaken vehicle if the white line lies on his side of the center-line stripe. The white barrier lines are three inches wide and are placed two inches from the normal, four-inch center line stripe.

For the purpose of informing the public as to the meaning of the new markings, signs bearing the legend, "Never safe to pass when white stripe is in your lane," are being placed at frequent intervals along the highways. These signs are not intended to mark the actual no-passing zones, but merely to remind the public of the meaning of the pavement markings. The state highway department believes that the proper observance

of no-passing zones will aid materially in the reduction of accidents and requests cooperation by all motorists.
