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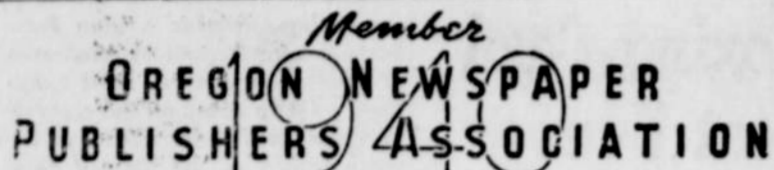

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TOURIST TRAVEL SHOWS DECLINE

For the first seven months of 1940, non-resident motor vehicle registration in Oregon totaled 74,417 vehicles against 84,735 for the same period a year ago, a decrease of 12 percent, it was announced at the secretary of state's office recently.

July registration continued to show a decline noted in tourist registration this year, with 27,125 cars this year against 31,721 cars for the corresponding month last year.

Seventy-five percent of the tourist registration in July represented cars from the three Western states, Idaho, Washington and California. There were 36 cars from Hawaii, two from Mexico, three from the Philippines, two each from Guam and American Samoa and one from Brazil.

Cave Junction, Ashland and Brookings led the various registration stations in Oregon in the number of out-of-state cars reported for the month, Cave Junction with 4,995, Ashland with 4,454 and Brookings with 2,814.

Following are the registrations from other cities in the state:

Question?—What Is Game Management?

Game management to the average sportsman is a rather abstract term. The reason is because so little information has been available and the subject is so new that the laymen have not had an opportunity to study or know about it. It differs from domestic livestock management in that with game, the control is principally of habitat and human use while with livestock we actually control the animals. As a matter of fact, with domestic stock we select the breeding dates, the time when they may go on the range or on the feed yard, how much salt or how much hay they may have, treat them for disease or parasites, fully control their numbers and do many other things which appear necessary for their well-being.

With game the order is reversed. The reasons are obvious, once we consider the problem. First, it is desirable to keep the animals wild because without that condition the game loses much of its value both as visual thrills and hunting sport.

Second, game should be kept in as near a natural state as possible to preserve its historic and sporting appeal. It is evident then that about the only other control that can be used is in adjustments of habitat and human use.

Management in the past has been confined chiefly to bag limits, open and closed seasons, sex selection, refuges, and control of predators. It has served to preserve most of the remaining species of game from extinction and in some places the results have been most gratifying. As both human use of the land and demands for hunting sport increase, it becomes necessary to increase the intensity of management to produce a maximum amount of game on the restricted and changed habitat.

The more the science of game management is studied and applied, the more evident it is that any measures applied to control of game habitat must be based on factual needs of the game and its dependent resources such as forage and cover and not on human desires. In places it may not be possible to apply the biological needs in full because it may not be economical to contribute the complete land resources to game. On the other hand, certain local and social demands may require just that.

Considering the factors available for the control of game, we may well accept Leopold's definition: "Game management is the art of making land produce sustained annual crops of wild game for recreational use."

There are four very important factors which must be determined as a basis for a successful management plan. They are:

1. A classification of species and fairly accurate estimate as to numbers.
2. The rate of increase and annual drain from all causes.
3. Extent and condition of range and forage available for use during each season of the year, particularly limited winter ranges.
4. Authority to apply measures indicated and control of factors influencing these measures.

The above measures will be taken up later as individual topics.

During the last few months thousands of report cards have been mailed in by sportsmen, and it is urged that during the remainder of the fishing season these cards be used.
