NOTICE TO FEDERAL INCOME TAX PAYERS

For the convenience of those who are required by law to file Federal Income Tax Returns, a Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue will be at Grants Pass, Feb. 19 to 25th inclusive at the Court House to assist taxpayers in preparing their returns. No charge will be made for this service. The matter of filing your Income Tax Return should be given immediate attention, in order to avoid penalty and interest.

You are required to file a return if your gross income is \$800 or over and you are single (or married and not living with husband or wife), or if you are married and living with husband or wife and your gross income is \$2,000 or over.

Form to be Used

Form 104A should be used for gross income of not more than \$5,000 derived from salaries, wages, interest, dividends, and annuities.

Form 1040 should be used for gross incomes from salaries, wages, interest, dividends, and annuities of more than \$5,000, and incomes from other sources regardless of amounts.

Billings and cooings, interspersed with bickerings and snickerings, bliss punctured by the throwing arm of a wife who doesn't miss, a dotting husband emitting a note of agony when sister-in-law comes to stay for a while and occupies the other twin bed—that's just about what to expect in the way of marital goings-on in Paramount's new comedy-drama, "I Want a Divorce," Wednesday and Thursday at the Cave City theater, starring Joan Blondell and Dick Powell.

As might be gathered, the result of this state of affairs is embodied in the title of the picture, but that's getting ahead of several important things. One is that Joan and Dick are supported by a grand cast including Gloria Dickson, Frank Fay, Jessie Ralph and Conrad Nagel. And another is that Joan and Dick, who are happily married in real life, are extraordinarily well cast as a pair of young people who marry, live happily, and then face the problem of divorce.

To buckle down to the story of the picture for a while, it tells how Joan and Dick meet while testifying at the divorce action of Joan's sister, played by lovely blonde Gloria Dickson. Joan hates what she has done — helped her sister gain a divorce — and tells Dick so.

Joan goes to live with her sister. She becomes fed up with her sister's friends, happens to meet Dick one night. The two young people get along very well. After Dick has passed his bar exams, they're married, and settle down to live on a small income.

They go along in a blissful state for a while, their happiness disturbed only by the usual marital pranks, such as wifey reading his old love letters, starting a dispute about where he was on a certain night a long time ago.

All this leads to a climax when Dick, admonished by his wife never to consider becoming a divorce lawyer, does become one to help out an old friend, Frank Fay. Dick attains a reputation as a specialist in divorce cases, and there's plenty more hilarity and misunderstanding when Dick becomes so busy getting divorces for his clients that he has no time for his wife.

A picture of this nature, with all its emphasis on horseplay and good-natured fooling, necessarily demands well-paced, artful direction, and if the previous efforts of Ralph Murphy are any criterion, moviegoers can expect a fast-moving, cleverly handled picture in "I Want a Divorce."

LIVESTOCK FARMS IN COAST REGION PROVE SUCCESSFUL

While the following article concerns the activities in Coos and Curry counties, the information herein concerned may be of interest to the farmers in this valley:

The establishment and maintenance of pasture on properly adapted cut-over and brush lands in Coos and Curry counties are relatively profitable as a basis for an expanding sheep and cattle industry in that region, according to detailed studies made by federal and state agricultural economists over the past few years.

The detailed findings of these economists, Harold R. Hochmuth of the USDA, and William W. Gorton of the farm management department at Oregon State college, have just been published as station bulletin No. 381, entitled "Ranch Organization and Range Land Use in Coos and Curry Counties, Oregon."

Although many hazards exist in this livestock enterprise, the returns are sufficient to warrant such hazards over a period of years, provide operators with a satisfactory income, and at the same time increase the general taxable wealth of the region.

The investigators found that the expansion of the livestock industry in this area in recent years is due to three factors. These are improved transportation, cooperation of forestry officials in the burning of logging slash and brush, and the introduction of improved varieties of grasses. It was found that improved grasses are an especially important item, not only for that region but throughout western Oregon, where one of the major needs is the improvement of pasture growth in cut-over lands and in other livestock grazing areas.

The operators in Coos and Curry counties who have been maintaining these improved pastures the longest reported to the investigators that the amount of feed produced is now on the increase rather than decrease. This gradual improvement in the pasture is being accomplished at little cost aside from the labor of the operator and his family.

It was found that the "theoretical average" ranch in that region runs 500 sheep, makes a ranch income of \$1533, a labor income of \$708, and returns 5 per cent on an investment of \$33 per sheep.

REGISTRATION OF AUTOS STOPPED BY LEGISLATURE

Oregon's visitors traveling by automobile will no longer be required to register their cars under the provisions of Senate Bill No. 4, which has passed the house without a dissenting vote. This bill was the first through the Senate, being unanimously approved, and was also the first Senate Bill to receive the approval of the House. Prepared and introduced at the request of Secretary of State Earl Snell, the bill bringing about this

repeal places Oregon in line with the many states that are doing all in their power to eliminate barriers between the states, and to promote the free and uninterrupted flow of traffic, with the least possible inconvenience and delay to the traveling public.

In commenting upon the measure, Mr. Snell stated that the need for non-resident registration had long since passed with the lowering of license fees, and that experience in handling this work had convinced him that it should be eliminated. He further stated that it would save the state some \$20,000 each biennium, which is the cost of the present service.
