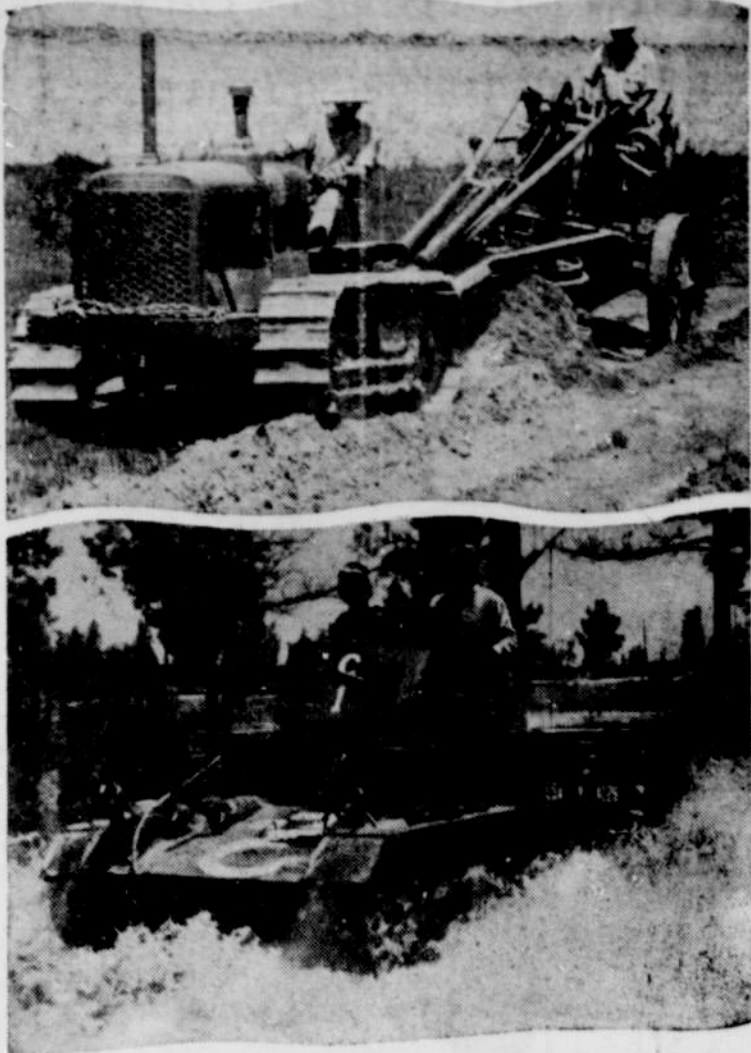

For minor changes in setting, approaches, etc., to make them conform with the rules and requirements of the service contemplated.

It is suggested and urged, therefore, that rural patrons throughout the county keep in mind to examine, straighten, repaint or replace boxes according to their respective needs during the week set aside, as stated, and beginning May 5. The printed letters which may be found in your mail box during the Improvement Week, or a few days before, is furnished by the Post Office Department, and is intended as a constant reminder of any defect in setting or condition of the same. In the serving of these notices (which outline briefly the postal regulations concerning rural delivery service) the carriers are performing a duty and service required of them by the Department. If they fail to place notice of or call attention to an obvious defect or omission concerned with the mail box, they are derelict in their duty.

cents at the time the license is obtained.

Payments to hospitals under the act will be by the state industrial accident commission and all hospitals, in order to apply for benefits, must register with the commission and agree to abide by the schedule of hospitalization costs fixed and promulgated for industrial accidents by the commission. Hospitals are required to make monthly reports to the commission, listing complete detail of the accident cases for which they make claims for payments.

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Under definitions in the act, "indigent patient" is defined as a person who has suffered an accidental motor vehicle injury is received and cared for in a hospital and is unable to pay for the cost of such care. It excludes an employee suffering from a motor vehicle injury on account of which he is entitled to the benefits of the workmen's compensation law. The patient is deemed unable to pay hospital charges "if it shall appear that, should an action be brought and judgment secured against him, or any person legally responsible for his care or support, for the amount thereof, execution thereon would be unavailing."

When claim for payment is filed by a hospital, it must contain an affidavit of the indigent patient, if living, and the state ment of a county court, county judge, county commissioner, or like official representative of a social agency engaged in the relief of the poor, having knowledge of the facts, is unable to pay such hospital charges.

**Grants Pass
Jersey Herd
Tops Nation**

An interesting news item was published in the Grants Pass Bulletin last week, concerning Josephine County's dairy herds. It will interest valley dairymen in knowing a Jersey herd in the county topped the nation for butterfat yield. Here is the entire story:

Making the highest average butterfat yield per cow of any Jersey herd finishing a year's test in 1940 through The American Jersey Cattle Club Herd Improvement Registry, Frank Schutzwohl's herd of 1 purebred Jerseys at Grants Pass, Ore., averaged 567.31 pounds of butterfat, 10,459 pounds of milk testing 5.42 per cent fat per cow on twice daily milking. The herd averaged 14.96 cows daily with an average of 13.53 cows in milk daily.

Announcement of the record, accepted and verified by The American Jersey Cattle Club, New York, N.Y., national organization of Jersey breeders, has just been received in a special release to the Grants Pass Bulletin. During the year's test the production of Mr. Schutzwohl's cows was checked by supervisors from the dairy department of Oregon State college at Corvallis. The test is the first made by the Schutzwohl Jerseys through the Herd Improvement Registry. Already entered for another test, the herd is again making an excellent record with an average of 43.11 pounds butterfat, 806 pounds milk for January, 1941, against an average of

37.54 pounds butterfat, 697 pounds milk for the same month in 1940 with approximately the same number of cows on test.

Fourteen United States purebred Jersey herds of varying sizes averaged 500 pounds or more of

butterfat per cow in Herd Improvement Registry tests during 1940 and of this number six were Oregon herds.
