"YOU'LL FIND OUT" WITH THE BOGIE MEN WED. AND THURS.

Kay Kyser, the Ol' Professor, surrounds himself with three of the screen's foremost bogeymen and a big cast of film and radio talent in supplying the novelty entertainment of his new picture, "You'll Find Out," at the Cave City theater Wednesday and Thursday.

In this musical mystery melody-rama Peter Lorre, Boris Karloff and Bela Lugosi supply the menace that upsets the romance of Helen Parrish and Dennis O'Keefe and terrorizes Alma Kruger and Kyser's entire band, particularly by Ginny Simms, Harry Babbitt, Ish Kabibble and Sully Mason.

Between broadcasts of the college of Musical Knowledge in a radio studio, Kay Kyser and his band fill an engagement to entertain at a big week-end birthday party in an old mansion in a deserted location. Seldom did gaiety have a more eerie setting than the fantastic edifice built by a now dead archaeologist and occupied by his spiritually inclined sister and his pretty young daughter.

Kyser and his pals are affected by the gloomy atmosphere and by the grim personalities of Saliano, a fake medium, and of Judge Mainwaring, the family lawyer. They are even more affected when they tempt have been made on the life of the daughter. One of these attempts nearly kills Ginny Simms.

Kyser and the band decide to leave the spooky place, but a bolt of lightning blows up the bridge which is the only exit from the estate. They pin their hopes on Professor Fenninger to solve the mysteries they meet around every corner. Fenninger has been engaged by the heroine to expose Saliano's crookedness to her aunt. Unfortunately, the Professor is an imposter also, and is in league with the Judge and Saliano to kill the girl and thus assure themselves of continued income through their elderly victim, the aunt.

How the three Bad Humor Men endeavor again and again to get rid of the girl, how Kyser stumbles across the secrets of Saliano's mediumistic tricks, and how the band leader manages to save the whole party from annihilation after a series of fantastic adventures with "black magic," lead to a happy conclusion for the romance, and a musical climax with Kay Kyser and his band back before the radio microphone.

An amendment to regulations which became effective April 19 provides that the time specified for the registrant to report for induction shall be at least ten days after date the order to report is mailed by the board, Colonel Wooton said. The time will continue to be specified by the boards, however, and selectees cannot change their date of reporting to suit themselves, he added.

At present the regulations require that the board only allow five days for the registrant to get his affairs in order after the order to report is mailed.

The amendment will also allow the board in special cases to extend the time for reporting beyond the ten day period. Whenever the board believes that unusual individual hardship may result it may

postpone the time for reporting for a period of not to exceed 60 days, subject to further postponement upon good cause therefor being shown. Colonel Wooton indicates the board might invoke such a clause in the regulations for such cases as a critical illness of a parent of the registrant at the time when the registrant is to report for induction, or for the reason at the registrant himself has become ill since physical examination and is unable to report.

Local boards will not allow the liberalization of the regulations to be a means of a registrant evading service or postponing service without cause, Colonel Wooton declared.

The United States government, through a subdivision of the department of agriculture, can contact virtually every farmer in the nation within 36 hours!

This interesting fact was pointed out in Oregon recently by Fred Estermille of Baker county, field representative of the AAA western region offices in Washington, D. C. Estermille said that the county and community committees, an important part of the administrative organization of the AAA, make possible this rapid action.

From a national defense standpoint, the value of such a rapidly working organization is obvious, Estermille said, and is a living denial of the erroneous idea that

only totalitarian forms of government can act swiftly.

Oregon has 137 county committeemen and 868 community committeemen, elected by their neighbors, who are in charge of local administration of the AAA farm program.
