FISHERMEN TURN IN CATCH RECORD CARDS IS REPORT

Return of catch record cards from sportsmen thus far this season exceeds in number all the cards returned last year, according to C. A. Lockwood, assistant supervisor of the Oregon State Game commission.

"The sportsmen are making an excellent showing in the use of the catch record cards this year," said Mr. Lockwood. "This is encouraging in view of the fact that the cards are essential to the completion of the survey of lakes and streams, now being conducted in various parts of the state."

"These cards should be filled out by every angler after each fishing trip. The cards require no signature and are postage free. Numerous sportsmen's organizations throughout the state are giving the campaign to acquaint anglers with the use of the catch record cards."

The cards may be obtained from the Portland office of the Game commission, as well as in practically every sporting goods store, and from game license agents, Mr. Lockwood pointed out.

NAVAL RESERVES ASKING FOR MEN

Enlistments are now being made in the Naval Reserve of men between the ages of 17 and 36 for 4 years or period of national emergency. Applicants for the Naval Reserve may enlist for the training of their choice and if qualified will be sent to the vocational school they choose.

Included in these schools are the aviation mechanic, aviation metalsmith, electrical, machinist, woodworkers, clerical and radio schools. Men who enlist in the Naval Reserve receive the same pay and chances for advancement as the regular Navy and duties are performed on ships of the regular Navy.

In the event that a man is returned to inactive duty prior to the termination of his four year enlistment, he may change over to the regular Navy if so desired. High school students who plan to enter the Navy or Naval Reserve after graduation are urged to make application now so that their enlistment papers may be completed by the end of the school term. A representative of the Navy Recruiting Service will be at the Post Office at Grants Pass on Monday and Tuesday of each week.

Traffic Accidents Must be Reported

All traffic accidents in Oregon must be reported, regardless of the amount of property damage or whether anyone was killed or injured, Earl Snell, secretary of state, replied today in answer to several inquiries on this matter received from Oregon citizens.

Confusion exists in the minds of many persons on this matter, these inquiries indicated. Many persons believe there is a minimum property damage limit under which accidents need not be reported. Some states, for example, do not require reporting of accidents in which no one is killed or injured and property damage amounts to less than \$50.00. However, in

Oregon, there is no such legal minimum and all accidents must be reported.

Accidents in rural areas should be reported to the sheriff of the county in which the accident occurred while accidents in urban areas should be reported to the local chief of police. These reports are required to be made within 24 hours of the time the accident occurred.

Accident reports in Oregon are not open to public inspection and may not be admitted as evidence in any court action arising from any accident, it was emphasized. The reports are used in assembling facts on accidents with the view of improving conditions and preventing their recurrence.

"TEXAS RANGERS RIDE AGAIN" IS A GREAT WESTERN

California Plans New Bureau

Cash-sepnding tourists will be induced to remain longer in the Redwood Empire and balance of California, if Assemblyman Ernest Crowley's bill is passed, calling for the state to install and maintain information bureaus in or near border inspection stations.

Bill proposes that qualified information and travel experts greet all incoming tourists at state borders, supply them with travel literature issued by existing non-profit travel promotion organizations (such as the Redwood Empire Association and others); also induce incoming tourists to see all of California.

Benefits, as outlined by Redwood Empire Association, sponsors of the measure: State, County and City treasuries would profit through collections of greater gas tax, sales tax, besides taxes paid by enterprise in the business of serving tourists; more ranch and farm produce would be consumed and paid for by tourists in dining rooms; more labor would be employed by transportation companies, hotels, restaurants, resorts, garages, service stations, motor court courts, purveyors and supply houses, also jobbers wholesalers, and retailers would sell more goods and employ more help; all other lines of enterprise will benefit.

It was pointed out that income from tourists in California last year totaled \$244,819,499.00; that

for every additional day tourists are induced to remain in Central and Northern California, \$9,725,000. additional would be spent.

The project would be extremely profitable to everyone in the state, cost of information bureau operations for the next two years approximating only \$19,150.00.

The bill provides that existing operation in the matter of plant quarantine inspection will not in any way be effected by the information bureaus, the latter to be an additional service, not a substitute service, according to George Hoberg, chairman traffic relations committee of the Association.

TUBERCULOSIS TESTS REPORT IS GIVEN

Less than one-half of one per cent of the 138,754 cattle tested in 1940 in Oregon for tuberculosis were reactors, according to figures compiled by the state department of agriculture animal division. Six hundred and nineteen cattle or 0.45 per cent were reactors.

Thirteen counties showed no reactors at all: Clatsop, Crook, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood River, Lake, Morrow, Sherman, Wallowa, Wasco and Wheeler.
