They were drawn to the district because in those preradio days the theater, and the honky-tonks surrounding it, was the only outlet for their songs.

While the actual physical street that was Tin Pan Alley during its many years has been repeated, and the tunes which come from it revived, the romantic drama which tells the story of the typical creators of melody lane is the thing in this really great picture.

MEMORIAL DAY CAN BREAK RECORD FOR SAFETY IN TRAFFIC

Memorial Day can establish something of a safety record if motorists avoid accidents as successfully this year as they did on the same holiday last year.

Although 1940 saw motor vehicle accidents increase 6 per cent, last Memorial Day there were only 30 traffic deaths in the entire country.

The danger, however, is increased this year, safety experts warn, because Memorial Day will begin a three-day week end for vast number of citizens.

Because of the long week end and the fact that many more people

will have much more money to spend, this may prove to be the most widely observed Memorial Day in a number of years; possibly even the most active since the depression started in 1929.

If all motorists remember that accidents don't just happen—that they are caused—Memorial Day this year may long be remembered as the day that we resumed our progress along the road toward a safer America.

Here are a few hints which may save many motorists from accidents:

Put your car in safe mechanical condition and keep it that way. Bald-headed, cut or bruised tires are more prone to blow out in warm weather. Be sure to check brakes and steering mechanism.

If you are going on a trip allow enough time for the journey to avoid hurrying. A sunvisor on the car and colored glasses over your eyes will prevent blinding glares which cause many crashes.

See that your car is well oiled and greased for a long trip. Don't drive and drink—ever. They just don't mix.

Watchout for people afoot. Remember that the road will be filled with drivers who have not been at the wheel much during the colder months. Be an expert driver and help to neutralize their mistakes.
