A LETTER FROM MAURICE SAUER

I left Seattle May 22, arrived at Seward, May 28. The trip from Seattle to Seward is a wonderful trip, mountains and snow can peaks on both sides all the way. Ketchikan was our first stop, which is one of the largest towns in Alaska. It has real narrow streets but a nice clean town.

Next stop was Juneau, it is built on a hillside and is a mining and sawmill town, next Cordova we took this town in a midnight, on to Valdez where the highway Richardson goes to Fairbanks.

We got into Seward at 2:30 a.m.

took in the town till 8 a.m. then took the train at 8 for Anchorage. Wasn't in town but a hour or so till I got a job as bridge carpenter for the Alaska railroad and am working 1 1/2 miles out of Anchorage. Go to work at 2 a. m. There is no night here, the sun is only down for a few hours. It seems so strange I just can't get used to going to bed when the sun is shining bright.

Anchorage is having quite a boom at this time, everything is high here now. Three room apartment \$65 a month, rooms \$3.50 per night and meals 65c to \$1.00. At Seward I had coffee and three doughnuts for 35c. Hair cuts 75c. That will give you some idea, but wages are up to 90c to \$1.50 an hour. It will be good here for a year or so.

I like it just fine so far but I don't think I would ever care to live here and I have been here only a short time. Some of the boys that came up when I did are ready to go back to the states already. This is no place for a 'lounge lizard' to come as he can't lay around here long and he can't thumb his way back either. I am working ten hours a day and seven days a week. If that is what you want you can get it here at this time.

SENATE PASSES \$50,000,000 DEFENSE HIGHWAY BILL

Moving swiftly, the Senate passed S.1589 June 16th authorizing \$250,000,000 for the immediate needed for the national defense. With one of two exceptions the bill passed the Senate substantially in the same form as introduced.

As introduced the legislation carried no specific amounts, merely authorizing the appropriation of such funds as may be necessary during the continuance of the national emergency. One important change in the Senate bill fixes an amount of \$250,000,000 as the total to be expended for all purposes. This is carried as an over-all authorization and makes no division as between the amounts to be expended for strategic roads, access roads and other purposes. In this connection, however, it is significant to note that the Senate Committee on Post Offices and Post Roads in reporting the bill stated that—"in the opinion of the Committee, such a sum would not be sufficient to accomplish all that would be done during the continuance of the national emergency. It should, however, serve to meet the immediate needs which require prompt attention. It is obvious that defense efforts must not be blocked by inadequate road facilities." From this it may readily be seen that additional highway defense appropriations are contemplated.

Senate Adopts 75-25 Matching Basis

After considerable debate the Senate approved an amendment which would make funds available to the states for improvements on the strategic network of highways on a basis of 75 per cent state funds. Funds for this purpose are to be apportioned among the states in accordance with the provisions of Section 21 of the Federal Highway Act.

Provisions for Access Roads Broadened

Another amendment includes as access roads (in addition to those to military and naval reservations and defense industry sites) those leading to sources of raw materials and further provides for the

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payment of right-of-way costs as part of such projects.

From present indications it will be at least two weeks before final action on the measure is taken by the House.

REDWOOD RANGER STATION LOOKOUT HOUSES ARRIVE

Three "ready-cut" lookout houses arrived at Redwood Ranger Station Monday afternoon. The houses, three out of a scheduled five to be stored at Redwood, will be distributed to various lookouts points in the local Page Creek district as well as other areas in the Siskiyou National forest in accordance with a National forest improvement plan.

When erection points for the houses are determined, they will be trucked as far as possible and then freighted by pack stock to their destination. All the lumber and equipment is "ready-cut" to the exact size needed in the erection.
