Three packers handle the movements of the 43 head of stock housed here in connection with the Redwood Remount Station. Decker Sowell has been packing for upwards of 10 years. Marvin Prentice and Hugh White are other packers this year.

The personnel of the 10-man crew at present includes Robert Coleman, Robert Smith, Arnold E. Ekstrand, Warren Jarman, Harold James, William J. McLean, Jr., John Abernathy, George Baldwin and Cecil Hamilton, cook, in addition to Owen.

This list of forest protectors is expected to remain on a permanent basis till the end of the "fire season".

Chetco Divide trail building activity is progressing with a five-man crew working out of Redwood station in charge of Marvin Ramsey forest service foreman. Pedro Osorio is "cat" driver and Leo L. Hassler is powder and blasting man. Francis X. Buchheit and Buster W. Branham are also in the crew.

The trail, when finished, will provide a new small-size motor-driving link between the coast and the valley, starting at O'Brien.

17 REPORTED FIRES NOTED IN DISTRICT; NO DEFINITE BLAZES

Seventeen reports of fires from lookouts was the net result of five straight days of the worst type of fire weather, thunderstorms, in the Page Creek district with headquarters at Cave Junction.

Up to press time none of the 13 fires had materialized into a serious blaze. Reported fires that men are directed to are in the vicinity of Whiskey Creek, the Cowboy Mine, Chrome creek and Cribb camp. Two fires were put out by the local crew.

An emergency force of seven fire fighters is working out of Redwood Station with "stand by" and dispatching action being taken by them on lookout fire reports as a method of blaze insurance. A similar-sized force is working out of Store Gulch in charge of Art Cribb.

Current weather predictions still rate thunderstorms as probable with hot weather still in the offing.

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Grants Pass

Pay Delinquent Personal Taxes AT ONCE!

CHAPTER 389, Oregon Laws, 1941, effective June 14, 1941, requires that we issue warrants for collection of delinquent taxes on personal property.

Warrants are to be filed with the County Clerk, and entered in the Judgment Docket.

The amount of such warrant shall become a lien upon the title to any real property owned by the person against whom the warrant is issued.

The effect shall be the same as though the people of the County had recovered judgment against the person or persons so charged.

The process of issuing, serving and docketing warrants covering delinquent taxes on personal property shall be mandatory.

Therefore it is our unavoidable duty to insist that all delinquent personal taxes be paid without further delay, or satisfactory arrangements made to liquidate same.
