It is suggested that this notice be called to the attention of local newspapers so that it may be brought to the attention of the public.

ROUND-UP ROYALTY

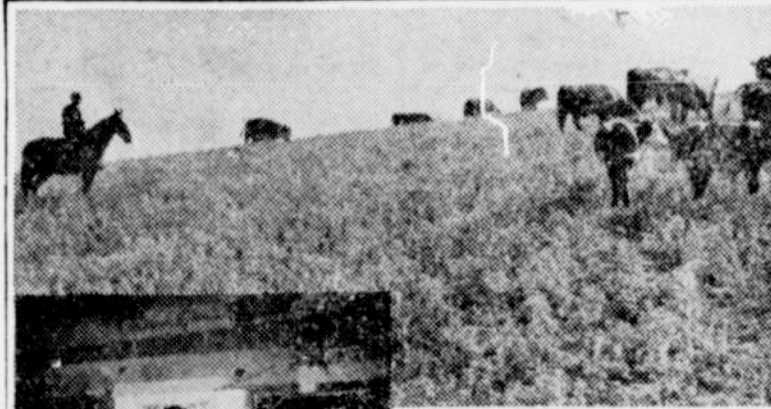
