Ginger Rogers' New Picture Delightful

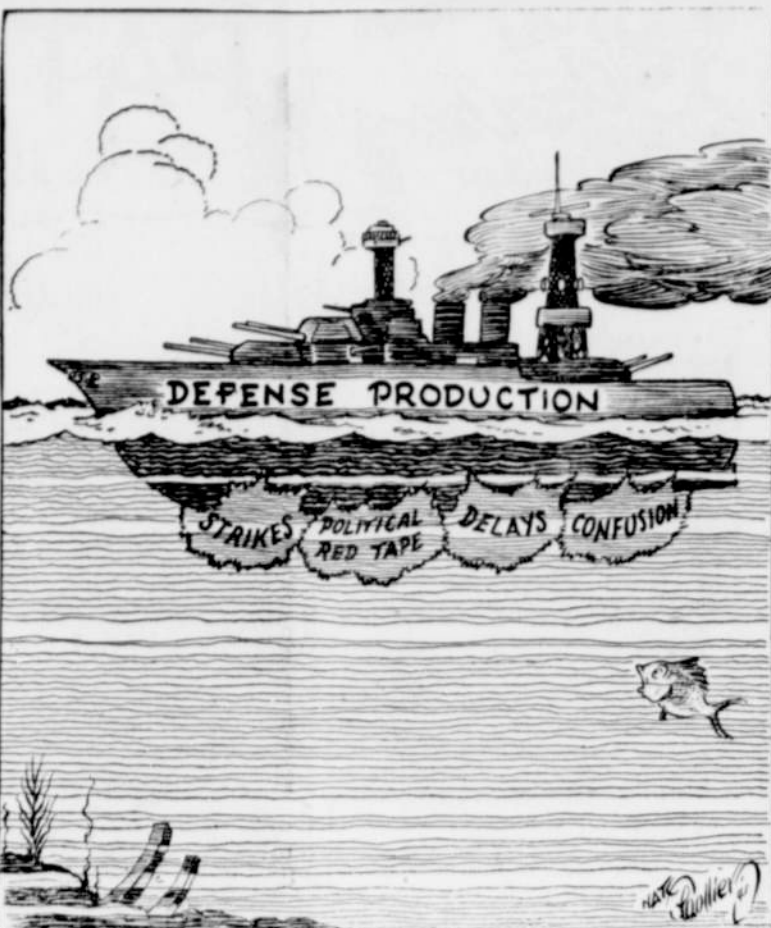

wrong. Instead of the spoils of the fresh grain fields came the interminable trains of wounded soldiers! In alarm, the tottering Berlin government sent Herr Helferich, the Vice Chancellor, to investigate.

Briefly, this is what he had to say about the Ukrainian adventure: "Our armies of nearly half a million men have not liquidated the war on the East front, as hoped, and the commanding officers give no assurance of liquidating it in either a military, economic or diplomatic sense in the months to come. We meet with no important mass resistance either from the peasantry or from the Bolsheviks but our losses from the Kleinkrieg (guerilla warfare) are very heavy and the audacity of these peasant marauders increases every day. The Skoropadski government, which we sustain with our bayonets, would immediately collapse if we withdrew, but even while sustain it, with heavy losses in men and material, none of the boasted economic potentialities of this land which have been reported to be fabulously rich, are realized.

"The Bread Peace is an illusion. Our armies are not living off the country but are drawing their rations from the meager resources of the Fatherland. The peasants refuse to sow for the next year and what is left over from the last harvest they hide under ground and keep for their own consumption. The Hetman is profuse in promises and expressions of good will but he produces no breadstuffs. Unfortunately the oil harvest is practically nil. With aid of skilled British and American technicians, the wells in the Caucasus have been put out of business and months will elapse before we can hope to see them flowing freely again."

In conclusion, the Vice-Chancellor urged the immediate and complete withdrawal of the arm-

ies from the Ukraine and he advised that they be sent to the Western Front (August 1918), where Ludendorff had at last realized his situation and was clamoring for replacements. Thus they were withdrawn and sent to the west, but they arrived too late. And as the High Command reported, "with a deteriorated morale as a result of their Russian experiences."

The Ukrainian adventure proved disastrous to Imperial Germany in 1918 and its silly repetition will prove catastrophic to the Hitler gang—if we but do our part. Let's stop the brigands while there is yet time. While the issue is still uncertain, let's tip the scale in favor of victory, decency and peace.
