Ganieri will have charge of outfitting first aid kits and supplying them to the stations.

A list of equipment needed in case of emergency for the emergency hospitals was compiled by the disaster relief committees and persons having anything to donate were requested to see Mrs. K. C. Hamilton at the Cave Junction Motor Court. Persons with these articles were asked to either donate them or inform the committee that they will be available at time of emergency.

On the list is the following: cots, (iron), single beds, mattresses, bed pans, urinals, irrigation sets, toilet paper, linens of all kinds, blankets, pillows, good sheets, old sheets, pillow slips, towels, unbleached linens, clean white rags, pajamas, bathrobes, basins, pitchers, dishes,

glasses, trays, hot water bottles, ice caps, flash lights, electric hot plates, cooking equipment, pots and pans, knives and forks and spoons.

Judge Childs Visits Cave Junction

Judge John L. Childs of Crescent City, Calif., was in Cave Junction Wednesday of this week working in the interest of the Western Tax Collection, a publication to the organization of an association of the eleven national forest states into an organization to go to Congress as a unit and demand money in lieu of taxes on all federally owned land.

Judge Childs has been working on this proposition for nearly three years and an interstate organization known as the Interstate Association of Public Land Counties has been formed.

Ten of the eleven states have shown interest in the organization, Senator McNary of Oregon has introduced a bill (Senate Bill 1201) which is passed by Congress will provide adequate relief. The particular phase of Judge Childs' work at present is to get influence behind this bill.

New License Plates Can Go On December 15th

The new 1942 Oregon license plates will blossom forth on motor vehicles after Monday, December 15th when it becomes lawful to attach them. Earl Snell, secretary of state, said today reminding motorists to make early application for the new plates to avoid mail congestion during the holiday season.

Motor vehicle registration in Oregon now exceeds 400,000, the year 1941 being the first time in history this figure was reached. If

a large portion of these owners delay their applications till late this month, the resultant congestion due to holiday mailing will work an inconvenience on many drivers, the secretary of state said.

Applications now are coming into the secretary of state's office at a rapidly increasing rate and new plates are being sent out by return mail. This prompt service can be maintained only during the period prior to the Christmas mailing rush, it was explained.
