### WHO SHALL DECIDE?

Right now Washington is being told by all kinds of experts that there are many ways to make synthetic rubber and to do it without delay. This suggestion leads to all kinds of disagreements that have reached the stage mentioned by Alexander Pope considerably over 200 years ago, when he asked the question: "Who shall decide when doctors disagree?"

The political doctors of the war administrators do not agree with the heads of 14 of the biggest oil companies, five of the greatest chemical corporations, and four of the biggest rubber manufacturers of the United States. They agreed with Secretary of Commerce Jones in April to produce all the synthetic rubber needed for civilian and military needs. But none of these concerns have been given the "go" sign by Ranger Station, Store Gulch and the government.
