## PARK FOR ILLINOIS VALLEY

## Higher Feed Costs Seen In Farm Outlook Report To Recreationists

The growing season has been generally favorable for hay and pastures, feed grain crops, and the oilseed crops from which high protein feeds are derived, yet the prospects are that feed will cost more and be less abundant in Oregon during the 1942-43 feeding season, according to a report on the agricultural situation just issued by the OSC extension service.

Oregon's hay crop of 1941 was considerably larger than average and the carry-over in May, 1941 was above average. Nearly all of this hay has been consumed and the carry-over is much less than last year. These conditions indicate a smaller supply of hay for the next feeding season although the number of hay consuming animals has increased somewhat.

Feed supply and price data for the country as a whole indicate that the increase in numbers of hay and grain consuming animals and poultry has resulted in a marked reduction of reserve grain and hay supplies, says the report.

The general prospect is that feed will cost more during the 1942-1943 feeding season, as the supply of feed grain in relation to the number of animals to be fed is expected to be about 10 per cent less than last year and probably below the 1937-1941 average. The situation is affected by the difficulty farmers are having to secure an adequate number of harvest hands even at farm wage rates substantially higher than a year ago.

## APPLICATIONS FOR DEER TAGS NOW BEING RECEIVED

Applications are now being received at the office of the game commission in Portland for the limited number of special tags to be issued for the taking of cow elk, doe deer and antelope in certain areas of the state.

There will be 2,000 cow elk tags issued at \$5 each for the open

territory, exclusive of Wallowa county, in northeastern Oregon. Doe deer tags will be limited to 3,000 and will be good for a specified area in Grant and adjoining counties. Fee for the doe deer tags is \$3.50. Practically the same portion of Lake, Malheur and Harney counties will be open again for antelope hunting and 1,500 tags at \$3.50 each will be issued.

Individuals wishing to apply for any of these tags should forward to the game commission office the proper fee together with information as to the number and kind of hunting license held. If by August 1, the applications exceed the quota of tags, a drawing will be held on that date to determine to whom tags shall be issued. Otherwise, applications will then be taken care of in the order they are received.
