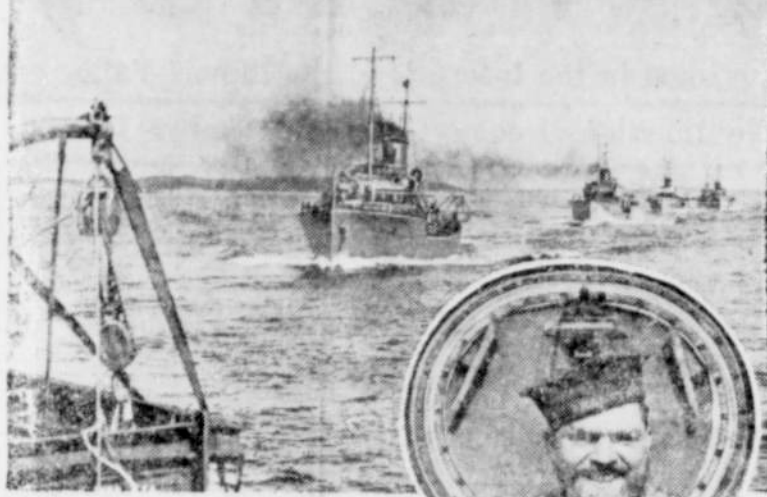

Small Destroyers, Rugged Sailors Out-Menace Atlantic Coast Sub-Menace



BLowing through calm off-shore waters of the Atlantic, these Canadian-built Corvettes, so fresh from the shipyards that their rivets are hardly cooled, head for the high seas to be put through their paces before being declared fit for service. Scores of these trim "rocket-size" destroyers, bearing names of Canadian cities and towns from coast to coast, are joined in the grim battle of the Atlantic to maintain vital life lines of the Allied Nations.

Alphonse Normand (right) of the Royal Canadian Navy, who sports a "navy beard" is typical of the seasoned, rugged sailors who man these new and modern destroyers. Normand likes to recall a sea battle

that took place somewhere on the Atlantic when his destroyer played host to four Junkers bombers of the Luftwaffe. All four attacking planes were brought down; two by the ship's Pom-poms, the others by a British fighter plane.

Scrap Metal Drive

to bring scrap into Cave Junction, there is a scrap pile started at the George Hicks garage. If there is anything I have not told you—GUESS the rest — BUT get the scrap metal, period.

For everybody's information — There is no money being paid for doing this work. It is all voluntary. Our county quota is 1600 tons. This means 200 pounds per capita. If the county reaches 100 pounds per capita, the county gets a victory pennant. The Illinois valley has been at the top of the county, population considered, in the amount of scrap metal delivered to date. Let's keep it there.

County trucks and maybe trucks from Camp White will make trips to the valley and haul the metal. The trucks will only go on the main highways, viz: Redwood highway, Caves highway, Deer Creek road, Holland road, Old Waldo road to Takilma and from Takilma to O'Brien via the Esterly mine. Have your scrap by the side of the road. The drive will take place in the valley Wednesday, October 7th. That is the date trucks will pick up the metal.

There will be a barrel set up at the George Hicks garage where scrap brass, copper, zinc, lead tin-foil and other non-ferrous metals can be deposited. If you have any of this kind of scrap, please bring it to the barrel. The valley at present is not delivering fats, rubber, etc.

The reason this drive must be a success is this: The steel mills must have scrap metal to make war material. There is only at present a 30 days supply on hand. Every ton we can send means more tanks, ships, planes and guns. Even our little might—what we can get together in this valley, will mean we are standing behind the boys who have gone to the front. They are in the thick of the fight. The least we can do is help send them the necessary arms to help fight with. Let's have all the scrap we can get — Our calling cards for the Axis partners.
