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OREGON LEADS THE NATION

It is gratifying in the extreme to have learned in the morning papers of today, that Oregon was leading the nation in the metal scrap drive with 45.5 pounds per capita in the first report.

This report gave Oregon 25,000 tons of scrap metal and this is only the beginning, we most certainly believe that before the drive is completed, this amount will be doubled with nearly 100 pounds per person for the entire state.

Trailing in second place was Pennsylvania with a per capita of 28.6 pounds, and the only other western state to attain a place among the first ten states was Idaho with 7.6 pounds per capita.

This does not mean that we have done enough and we can lay down and rest on our laurels. Being the first state is not the important thing. Getting the scrap metal to Uncle Sam is the big idea, and every resident of the valley should not rest until every pound of scrap available is collected and sent to the mills to make arms and ammunition that will make monkeys out of the Axis trio.

Come on Illinois Valley. We are leading the county, but don't let that little honor stop our endeavors in getting all the scrap we can collect to help provide the tools necessary for our boys to win.

This newspaper is proud of the efforts of the valley residents, proud to live in such a patriotic community, and it would not surprise us if we were the leaders in the state per capita in collecting scrap metal.

"The court has properly rebuked Lew Wallace, Democratic candidate for governor, and members of the Democratic state central executive committee by denying their requested writ or mandamus to compel Secretary of State Earl Snell, who is also Wallace's gubernatorial opponent, to accept President Roosevelt's picture for publication in the official voters' pamphlet for the November election.

As a part of the coming celebration of the first anniversary of the Aircraft Warning Service in Oregon, Governor Charles W. Sprague made a personal visit to the Information Center located in Portland.

Expressing his appreciation to the women who have volunteered part of their time to the work of the IV Fighter Command here, he said:

"You women have done a tremendous job in the filter centers of the state and on the observation posts. The state of Oregon is mighty proud of you and your work. I wish there were more that we Oregonians could do for you than just expressing our thanks."

Governor Sprague issued the following proclamation to the volunteer workers of the Aircraft Warning Service in celebration of the event:

"October 7th marked the first anniversary of the establishment of the Aircraft Warning Service in Oregon. For twelve months you have tirelessly scanned the skies, night and day, rain or shine, with continual vigilance, that the state of Oregon might be defended against the attack of enemy bombers.

On Wednesday, September 9th, 1942, your patience and tireless endeavor found its first reward when, due to the work of the Aircraft Warning Service, the first Japanese plane to invade our skies was located, its bomb rendered valueless, and its carrier subma-

ine bombed in turn by our military air force.

On behalf of the state of Oregon, I thank you for your endeavors and congratulate you upon your splendid performance."

State Wide Committee Urges Legislative Boost

With Dr. William G. Everson, president of Linfield college, McMinnville, as chairman, a state-wide committee has been organized to present to voters the merits of the referendum measure which would increase the pay of legislators from \$3 to \$8 a day for a session of not more than 50 days. Frank Bramwell, former state bank commissioner, is treasurer and Vernon Williams of Portland executive secretary of the committee.

More than 100 prominent men and women of the state are members of the committee and on its executive board are such well known citizens as Archbishop Edward D. Howard, Mrs. P. S. Kaadt and Mrs. V. D. Duseberry. Committee membership includes leaders in civic, church, labor, grange and welfare activities throughout the state without regard to their political affiliations.

The measure, in the form of a constitutional amendment, which will be voted on November 3 was passed by the last legislature and is submitted to referendum for adoption by the people.

election in question, thereby sustaining the position taken by the secretary of state upon advice of the attorney general.

"That settles the legal question involved in the proceeding, but leaves it for the people to pass judgment on the cheap political trick Wallace and his campaign strategists sought to perpetrate on his opponent."

"From the first the true objectives of Wallace and his committee in bringing the action have been obvious. First, they sought to gain cheap publicity for their candidate by tying him more securely in the public mind to the tail of the president's kite of popularity as our war leader. Second, they sought to discredit Snell in the opinion of the president's admirers and followers by jockeying him into the false position of being antagonistic to and prejudiced against the chief executive.

"In the courts they never had any hope of succeeding. With the people the transparency of their motives foredoomed their crude plotting to failure. Demagoguery must be more cleverly masked than that to succeed."
