Two measures are Referendum Ordered by Petition of the People. The first is the Cigarette Tax Bill. Purpose: To levy a tax of one cent on a package of cigarettes containing 10 smokes or two cents on a package of 20. Five-sixths of this fund goes to old age assistance. We are going to let the cigarette smokers decide.

The next bill is the so-called steelhead fish bill, prohibiting net fishing in coastal streams. This measure is causing considerable excitement from both pro and con proponents. The State Commission seems against the measure, but it has many boosters. It will limit salmon fishing on coast streams that now is permissible. Ordinarily this might be all right. But we need fish now that meat is scarce, and we don't see the logic of putting a damper on fishing at this time. Steelhead fishing is still good as told by our Joe Wharton, the man who knows, and it will still be good for the next years to come, and we do not believe the little fishing on the coastal streams by salmon fishers is cutting down the run of steelhead. I think we have to vote NO on this measure, but we do not want to influence you if you believe otherwise, because we are in some doubt about it.

Proposed by Initiative Petition is a bill Distributing Surplus Funds to School Districts, Reducing Taxes Therein.

This gives poor school districts some money from rich school districts and equalizes the tax burden for school purposes. We are for this measure and recommend a YES vote.

If you have read all of this, we hope we have given some light on the offices to be filled and the measures. Space prevents a full discussion of measures. Our only concern now is to have you come out and vote. You may disagree with us all down the line. That is your privilege, and that is what makes the ballot box protect our democracy, and we hope you all come out and exercise your rightful heritage to vote as free men and women can in this country. Come out and vote for America.

Bowman stressed the need for much more complete manning of all posts. They stated that this will be possible only through the all-out cooperation of all of our people. 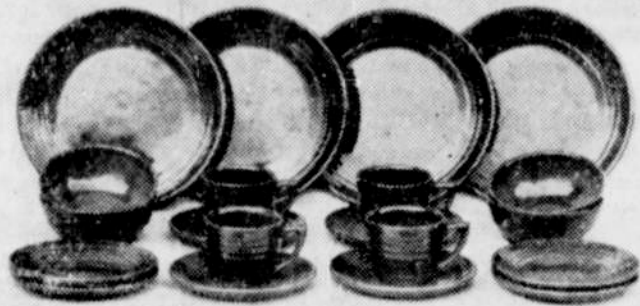
