FLYING JEEP GOES ANYWHERE

The soldiers' beloved jeep, able to do anything, anywhere, any time (except, perhaps, KP), has now been adapted for the air. Thus industry has come forth with the flying jeep, a new liaison plane for Army ground forces.

The flying jeep is a small, rugged, highly maneuverable plane designed to be the "eyes upstairs" of the artillery, tank corps, cavalry and infantry. It weighs only 2,100 pounds, is 24 feet long, has a 34 foot wing span, and is powered by a 190-horsepower engine.

Like its first cousin jeep on the ground, the flying jeep goes wherever the ground troops go—operating from cow pastures, highways or other improvised landing fields. It can land or take off after an unusually short run and can climb at a sharp angle to clear trees or other obstructions.

Manned by a pilot and observer, with radio equipment for ground and other plane communications, the sky jeep can maintain the exceptionally low speed of less than 45 m.p.m. while directing artillery fire or movement of tanks or troops. Relatively little gasoline and service work are needed for the flying jeep—a boon on battlefronts where supplies are a serious problem.

Fuselage of the flying jeep is made of welded steel tubing, but wings and tail surfaces are of wood, according to a revision of original plans which saves 20 per cent of the steel and 70 per cent of the aluminum originally called for.

To absorb landing shocks on rough terrain, the stroke of the spring-and-oil shock absorbers has been lengthened to approximately double that of conventional types.

Oranges, Grapefruit and Tangerines Victory Food

SAN FRANCISCO — Designation of fresh oranges, grapefruit and tangerines as the Victory Food for the period January 7 to January 16, was announced last Saturday by Merritt A. Clevenger, Pacific Region Administrator for the Agricultural Marketing Administration.

Reiterating his confidence in the cooperative spirit of the American homemaker, Clevenger said, "I know housewives favor Victory Foods as a means of calling attention to the place these foods deserve in wartime food management."

An abundant crop of citrus is coming to market this winter and it is urged that consumers use the fresh fruit and conserve other foods needed for the war.

"Restrictions on tin," said Clevenger, "have practically eliminated the canning of citrus for civilian consumption. It is more necessary than ever that oranges, grapefruit and tangerines be consumed in their fresh form to prevent waste of a valuable food."

Reported prospects of the national production of the 1942-43 citrus crops, according to the December crop report of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, total about 143,000,000 boxes — which is 6,000,000 boxes greater than the estimated production for last year of slightly less than 137,000,000 boxes.

DO NOT TELL! DO NOT TELL!!

On battle fronts every day men risk their lives to discover the location and strength of the military units of the enemy. Yet at home, to many of us are presenting the enemy with information of the same military value, the Office of Censorship says in a statement.

This is the information which newspapers and individuals are asked not to tell the enemy:

DO NOT TELL the names of ships upon which sailors serve.
DO NOT TELL the troop units in which soldiers serve overseas.
There is no objection to revealing that Pvt. Jones is in Australia or that Seaman Tom Brown saw action in the Atlantic, but there is military information which endangers the lives of American fighting men in stating that Pvt. John Jones, "Company C, 600th Infantry," is in Australia, or Seaman Tom Brown, "Aboard the U. S. S. Wisconsin," is in the Atlantic.

The Office of Censorship says: "We ask editors not to publish these troop identifications, and we ask parents and relatives not to reveal them. Don't give the enemy anything that may lengthen the war."

S. P. WAR JOB TOPS RECORD FOR THIRD YEAR

Southern Pacific carried its biggest transportation load in 1942 for the third year in succession, and although it faces even greater operating difficulties in 1943, the company it determined to overtop what it has done in the past.

A. T. Mercier, president, writing on the railroad's activities in the first year of the war, makes this report in an article for the January issue of the company's employee magazine.

In pledging Southern Pacific to the handling of a still greater wartime traffic, President Mercier says: "We look to the continuation and extension of the excellent cooperation we have had from military and commercial shippers, from the Office of Defense Transportation, and from other railroads; the tolerance and understanding of travelers and the general public, and the first rate teamwork and enthusiasm of the men and women of the Southern Pacific."

With more than 9,000 of its former employees in the armed forces at the end of 1942, Southern Pacific has labored under a serious shortage of manpower and at the present time is short approximately 10,000 men, Mercier says. The railroad has also lacked some equipment, particularly locomotives, and its operations have been affected by a shortage of certain materials and facilities. However, it is pointed out, the company has been able to continue numerous improvements in its physical plant, at a cost of \$104,000,000 in the last three years.

In spite of all difficulties, with

fine spirit and effective cooperation all round, Southern Pacific was able to handle the record traffic without widespread congestion or prolonged delays, Mercier concludes.
