Petition Aimed At Hospital Is Going Round

The Grants Pass Bulletin had the following story in their issue of January 1:

A petition, which reportedly will ask the county court to open the Josephine general hospital up to practices by all classes of practitioners licensed by the state, has been circulated throughout the county and, also according to report, will be presented to the court after Lucius Robinson, newly-elected commissioner, takes office.

Members of the county court and numerous private individuals contacted by the Bulletin reported having heard about the petition. One former county commissioner, H. S. Morgan, said that he had seen the petition and that he believed it asked for the hospital to be opened to all who are licensed to practice the healing arts in Oregon.

A similar move was made nearly two years ago when a bill was introduced into the state legislature calling for all publicly-owned hospitals to be opened up. Local opposition to the bill arose and it was defeated. It was pointed out at the time that there were only two publicly-owned hospitals in the state — one in Multnomah county and the Josephine general hospital, which is owned by Josephine county.

The Josephine general hospital has been operated since it was built under rules which permit only licensed medical doctors to attend patients there and to operate. — Bulletin.

TAX COLLECTIONS HIT \$314,962 FOR NEW RECORD

Taxpayers of Josephine county set something of a record for themselves during November and December when they paid taxes in the amount of \$314,962.32, representing some 86 per cent of the whole amount of taxes due to be collected in the coming year, says the Grants Pass Bulletin.

Deputy Sheriff Lloyd Lewis announced the collection figure, which includes collections through Tuesday. The total tax roll, turned over to the sheriff's office for collection on last October 15 amounted to \$364,889, the record collection to date leaving only \$49,966.63 to be collected in the next ten months, Lewis pointed out.

More people paying taxes than ever before and more paying a full year in advance were the principal factors credited for the heavy collection. A large percentage of the taxes paid were delinquent from previous years, but the collection records have not been segregated so that the exact amount could be given. It is expected that if current tax payments still due from those making quarterly payments are paid as promptly, the collection this year will exceed the amount of the current tax levy by a large percentage.

Lewis also pointed out that the recent collection is the second one to be made this year. The March 15 collection was better than average, amounting to 102.76 per cent of the roll. The dual collection this year resulted from the change in collection periods from the former calendar year to the present fiscal year of July 1 to June 30.

The financial position of local governments will further be helped next month when the sheriff's office starts a drive for the payment of delinquent personal property taxes. A new state law which requires the issuance of warrants for collection where personal property taxes are delinquent will be invoked after warning is given.

Farm Mobilization Day To Be Observed Jan. 12

Farm and civic leaders throughout the state have been invited by R. B. Taylor, chairman of Oregon's USDA war board, to help bring about wide observance of Farm Mobilization day, Tuesday, January 12. This is the day proclaimed by President Roosevelt and state governors to mark the beginning of a nationwide drive to enlist every individual farmer in the 1943 food production program.

Highlights of the day will be a national broadcast over all four networks, starting at 1 o'clock Pacific war time and featuring internationally known leaders of the United Nations. Special Oregon programs will also be carried by radio stations in this state, including several over KOAC.
