### CAN CONGRESS MODERNIZE

There is a lot being written and said about "what Congress is going to do," this year. Senator Wiley of Wisconsin told his colleagues how to do it! He laid his formula before the Senate Committee on Rules of which he is a member. It is an opening wedge for close cooperation between Senate and House Committees. He expressed the belief that the legislative body should study great problems of government through Joint Committees of the two Houses. He insists that it is high time that Senate and House modernize legislative processes regarding the budget, appropriations, finance, taxes and ways and means. He declares that joint meetings would produce "logical coordinated plans." The same formula, he says, would enable responsible representatives of the Senate and House to reach agreements on such subjects as internal revenue, social security, military aviation and

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—whatever of great importance requires similar intensive study and action.

Senator Wiley's "blueprint" shows how to modernize Congressional machinery—not a "jerry-built modernization." He seems to have the answer to simplification of what Congress can do to lift it to a place which would warrant full public confidence.

### ACCORDING TO QUIZ

It may not be a matter of news that needs to be repeated from Washington, D. C., but last Sunday night a group of very prominent "Quiz" folks appeared to agree that after victory the Government of the United States will try to continue its present all-over control of the national industries that are now engaged in war production. That idea is being urged for inclusion in peace plans. The rise to world power of Russia is being pictured as a rebirth of "nationalism" that goes far beyond what we call "democracy" in our country.

Isn't it safe to assume that America should win its own peace by going back to safe-and-sure processes of government that protected private initiative among all classes of citizens—from the bottom to the top? Think it over!

### NEW RULING BARS PACKAGES TO MEN IN FOREIGN LANDS

The large volume of mail and packages sent to troops overseas will make new army postal restrictions necessary, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson announced this week from Washington.

Effective immediately, no package may be sent to a soldier overseas unless it contains an article requested by the soldier, and the request has been approved by his commanding officer. The package will not be accepted by the postoffice unless the written request bearing the commander's signature is presented, Stimson said.

The only exception will be in the case of soldiers sent abroad while packages addressed to them were in transit. Magazines and newspapers may be mailed only by publishers.

V-mail will continue to be welcomed, Stimson said, but ordinary letters bearing air mail stamps will be handled like regular mail.

### PARACHUTE BOMB FOR FLYING BOMBERS

The latest development in aerial assaults and one which is going to take its toll is the parachute bomb.

Invented specifically for fast, low-flying bombers or the larger types of fighting planes, parachute bombs are the weapons of "hedge-hopping" planes, which heretofore have not used bombs at all, but have done their ground strafing

with machine guns and automatic cannon.

Hedge-hoppers fly very low, sometimes just above the trees. Unlike the high-altitude bomber and the dive bomber, the hedge-hopper is comparatively safe from enemy gunfire because its speed—400 feet a second, or 275 m.p.h.—does not make it a target long enough to aim and fire a gun.

The hedge-hopper, however, is in danger of being struck by the splinters of its own bombs exploding on the ground some 40 feet below. Even a 10-second delay before explosion—which is considered long—is not enough to assure the plane safety from splinters. Furthermore, unless stopped by a solid wall, the bomb may roll from 100 to 200 feet away from the spot on which it was dropped.

An "air-brake" or parachute on a bomb can solve these problems. The parachute opens automatically after the bomb has been dropped for about 10 feet, reducing the speed of the bomb, and shortening its "range," so that it will fall not directly below the plane, but some 80 to 100 feet behind it. It will also make the bomb strike the ground at a steeper angle.

Bombing of this type requires split-second timing because of the speed of the plane and the short distance to the target. The "chute" enables the pilot to get away before the explosion.

### WAR RATIONING

SUGAR—Stamp No. 10 in Book 1, good for three pounds, expires January 31, 1943.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 28 in Book 1, good for one pound, effective to February 8. (For bookholders 15 years of age or over only).

GASOLINE—Stamps numbered 3 each good for four gallons (total 32 gallons) effective December 1 to January 21, 1943.

TIRES—Inspection dates: Cars with license numbers from 1 to 110,000 prior to December 26; 110,000 to 140,000, between December 26 and January 2; 140,000 to 170,000, January 2 to 9; 170,000 to 200,000, January 9 to 16; 200,000 to 250,000, January 16 to 23; 250,000 and above, January 23 to 31.
