sponsoring an inter-class contest to see which class will purchase the most war stamps or bonds in a two-week period, beginning January 28th and ending February 10th. At the end of the first day the Sophomores are leading with \$7.25.

The Fire and Air Raid Prevention Committee with Glenn Halm as chairman has inspected and cleaned the premises of fire hazards, have made provisions for evacuating the building during fire and air raid drills. PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX EXPLAINED

A number of questions have been asked by taxpayers relative to personal property. A few questions from the laws governing such taxes and the collection thereof should clarify the situation.

"The term personal property in this state shall be construed to mean livestock, farming implements, merchandise and stock in trade, moveable machinery, equipment used in manufacture, also improvements made by persons on lands claimed by them under the laws of the United States, the fee of which lands is still vested in the United States."

It is the intention of this office to notify each and everyone of any delinquent personal tax appearing in their names on our tax rolls. In many instances this will be impossible due to the failure of the party or parties assessed to keep this office informed of their proper address.

"It shall be the duty of each person, firm or corporation owning real or personal property within the state, or against whom taxes upon real or personal property are chargeable, to keep the tax collector of the county where said real or personal property is situated, informed of the true and correct address of said person, firm or corporation, and no such person, firm or corporation who fails, refuses or neglects to keep said tax collector so informed shall be permitted to plead lack of due notice given by said tax collector in any suit, action or other proceedings commenced or prosecuted under the provisions of this act or in any matter growing out of the administration of this act."

If you do not receive a statement and you think there is any possibility of your being assessed with a personal tax, contact this office at once.

A letter together with a statement of taxes is being mailed and this letter explains the mandatory statute directing the issuing, serving, and docketing of tax warrants and has the effect of transforming this tax lien into a judgment of record against the taxpayer.

OFF IN A CORNER WITH PHIL SNORT

Dear Ed:

I have been getting word both direct and indirect from boys in the service of Uncle Sam, and it makes me happy to know that they all read either the Courier or the Illinois Valley News and that they approve what I write, or at least say they do. It must be a fine thing for those boys to get their home paper, home news in which they must delight to see written words by those they know, or to see therein the names of friends and loved ones and the things that are happening in their far-away home-land. Some of these boys of ours—I say "ours" advisedly—have asked me to write more and often and I am just selfish enough to comply to their wishes, but I feel that I dare not take up too much space in our home papers, for these are very unhappy times and almost everyone scans the columns for war news.

Here are the names of two of our valley boys who are among the missing and whose parents live at Cave Junction and O'Brien: Aubrey Renfro, son of Dave Renfro, sawmill operator on the Caves highway. When last heard from he was in the Philippines before their fall to the Japs; Galen McCray, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert McCray, of Elk Creek Camp, O'Brien. Galen was on a tanker that was either captured or sunk, in the Gulf of Mexico, off Texas. The tanker just disappeared with all on board. Galen leaves a wife, Irene and a little daughter. It seems that these good neighbors of mine are carrying a load of sorrow and trouble. Not only losing their son, Mrs. McCray underwent a major operation, at our Josephine General hospital, and is still in a critical condition at her home in Elk valley. Irene and little Wanda have gone back to their home in Texas. All of our hearts go out to these good and sorrow-borne people.

While parents and friends are overshadowed with sorrow our boys missing in this global war, there are rays of sunshine, pride and hope breaking through the clouds of terrorism, the fruits of hate, greed and ignorance, man using God's great creation to destroy his own kind. There is sunshine in the knowledge that we live in a country unhampered by war-lords, dictators and would be conquerors; pride in our young American youth who are willing to lay down their lives in protecting this land of liberty, equality and opportunity; hope that the fruit of their efforts will be a lasting peace, a peace that is vigilantly guarded by a World Court and a world peace, represented by all nations of earth, that no nation shall be allowed to force its form of government upon another nation or meddle with its internal affairs. It Takes Both, War Bonds and Taxes, to Win — Victory Tax Special Direct Levy Asked to Help Meet Heavy War Costs

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Approximately 50,000,000 American workers began to make an added contribution to the War cost this month in the form of a 5% Victory tax.

For many millions of Americans the Victory tax and the 1943 income tax are the first direct levies to be made by the Government to meet the staggering War costs. And it will take both . . . taxes and War Bonds . . . to provide the supplies and materials to win the War and the peace afterwards.

The Treasury Department estimates that the Victory tax will raise approximately \$2,000,000,000. Every person receiving more than \$12 per week must pay the Victory tax upon that part of his income over and above the \$12. For example, a married man with a salary of \$50 per week, with two dependents, would make only a net payment of \$1.06 per week after allowance for post-war credit.

The Government has made every effort to make the impact of the new tax as light as possible. The law, in effect, provides that in the case of married persons whose sole income is from wages or salary, 40 percent of the Victory tax paid (up to a maximum of \$1,000) plus 2 percent for each dependent (up to a maximum of \$100) may be used as a credit against whatever Federal income taxes the individual may owe at the end of the year—provided he

has purchased certain War Bonds, or paid old debts or paid life insurance premiums equal to the amount of this credit. In the case of single persons this credit will be 25 percent of the Victory tax paid (up to a maximum of \$500). Should the Victory tax credit exceed the individual's Federal income tax, the unused portion of the credit may be refundable to the taxpayer.

Even with the Victory tax, the 1943 income tax, and all other taxes paid by individuals, the average American will have more money with which to buy War Bonds than he has ever had before. Here are the statistics which explain that statement:

In 1940 the total income payments made to the American people amounted to about 76 billion dollars. In that same year the total personal taxes paid, Federal, State and local,

were roughly 2.5 billion dollars, leaving 73.5 billion dollars of disposable income. During 1943 total income payments are expected to rise to 125 billion dollars and total personal taxes under existing revenue legislation will be 15 billion dollars—leaving 110 billion dollars of income at our disposal as against only 73.5 billion dollars in 1940.

In 1943 Mr. Average American will still be carrying a much lighter tax load than his Canadian or English brothers-in-arms. In Great Britain total national and local taxes paid by individuals at present amount to 31 percent of the national income. In Canada, total individual taxes amount to 25 percent of the national income. In the United States, total personal taxes, Federal, state and local, will amount in 1943 to 18 percent of national income. Our English allies invest an additional 10 percent of national income in War savings. Our Canadian allies invest an additional 11 percent of national income in War savings. We Americans, to match the record of our Canadian neighbors, would have to invest this year 20 percent of our national income in War savings. To match the English record we would have to invest 23 percent of national income in War savings.
