**Hard Luck For Hitler**



Welders in Canadian war plants wear "jinx masks" as they cook up something devilish for the Axis. Designs painted on the welders' masks are like those of African head hunters out for the kill.

CANADA is producing war materials at the annual rate of \$2,500,000,000, Munitions Minister C. D. Howe has announced. Orders placed by the Department of Munitions and Supply now are well in excess of \$6,000,000,000 and the total is rising rapidly as Canada's industrial machinery nears its planned maximum production. Value of war products actually delivered to date nearly \$2,000,000,000, and, in addition, about \$1,000,000,000 has been expended on plants, machinery and defense projects.

In addition to these amounts spent by the Department of Munitions and Supply there have been war shipments of metals, food-stuffs, timber and other supplies to the United Nations valued at an estimated \$1,500,000,000.

Canadian war supplies are being used on every battlefield. They have been allocated as follows:

- 30% Canadian forces at home and abroad.
- 50% United Kingdom or British combat areas and Russia.
- 20% The United States, China, Australia and the Pacific theatres of war.

Canadian munitions have been in every battle since Dunkirk and they have played no inconsiderable part in the United Nations' victories in North Africa and Russia.
