## NEW FOREST FIRE LAW HAS TEETH

Approved by the President on December 24, 1942, H. R. 7141 (77th Congress), now Public Law 844, includes "livestock, forage, forest products and standing timber suitable therefor" as "war material" under the Sabotage Act of April 20, 1918. For the duration of the war, "wilful injury or destruction" of timber or forest products by incendiarism or trespass is a federal offense punishable by a fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than 30 years, or both.

"The importance of wood and

other forest products in the war effort is given recognition in this amendment," said acting regional forester H. J. Andrews, U. S. forest service, Portland. "It brings home the seriousness of forest fires in wartime, particularly when caused by incendiarism or wilful carelessness. We had an excellent forest fire record last year, thanks to favorable weather and the patriotic response of our citizens. We want to do even better in 1943, and a widespread knowledge of this new wartime federal law will help. And perhaps we can all acquire good habits in wartime that will carry over into the peace."

buying this stock to resell to those who want to milk cows instead of seeing them slaughtered for beef.

Any farmer who has surplus stock for sale, or who wishes new stock to increase his herd, should get in contact with the FSA office in Grants Pass or with Ed Hughes, who is field agent for the dairy animal conservation program in four counties.

Mr. Hughes has placed 400 calves in the Klamath area and has hauled 276 out of Coquille for other areas. The state office has 2000 calves in this area alone, and
