THE WAR BOND DRIVE

Raising thirteen billion dollars in three weeks, or rather selling that much security in three weeks, was a job never before tackled by any nation in the world. With a national debt of over a hundred billion dollars already staring us in the face the thirteen billions more, as far as the amount was concerned, was not so important, but when it had to be sold that was a different matter.

The drive will go over the top, we are sure, but Josephine county is still behind. Last Monday night, we were one hundred and twenty thousand dollars from our goal, and this hundred thousand for this county must come from the small individual buyer, the ones who buy \$25 bonds. If every mill worker and every farmer and every miner, who is on a pay roll would buy a \$25 bond, it would tear a very large hole in that hundred thousand shortage. The valley residents have done very well, but we can do better. Friday, May 30th is the last day. We could finish our quota if we want to.

When the news came from Crescent City that Eugene Brown had won his case from the claim jumpers who were trying to take his chrome mine, the people in the valley were jubilant.

While it seemed that it took a long time for the decision to come, when it did appear, it made everything quite clear, and the language in the decision was such, that legitimate miners who have taken a claim and have done their work, are absolutely protected by law, and claim jumpers will have a hard time in the future.

Red Cross to Hear Commodore Longfellow

Commodore W. E. Longfellow, the No. 1 man of First Aid Water Safety and Accident Prevention of the National Red Cross, will arrive in Grants Pass Monday, May 3, and will give his popular and interesting talk entitled "What's Under Your Hat", at the library auditorium Monday evening at 8 o'clock, according to an announcement made by Judge W. A. Johnson, chairman of the Josephine county chapter.

Commodore Longfellow gives his talk in several different costumes. His address relates to the need of first aid water safety and accident prevention for each of the characters he represents. His performance will be interesting and inspirational, not only to instructors and chapter personnel but to the general public.

The judge stated that the library auditorium is being re-decorated and the floors re-finished and that he believed that the paint would be sufficiently dry to be utilized on this occasion. In the event the auditorium should not be ready, the meeting will be held in the circuit court room.

FARMERS MUST APPLY FOR PERMITS

Only eleven farmers have applied for slaughter permits since Food Distribution Order No. 27 went into effect April 1, according to Raymond Lathrop, chairman of the County USDA War Board. The provision of this order affects all persons who slaughter and sell dressed meat from cattle, calves, hogs, sheep or lambs. All

meat sold must have a permit number stamped or written in indelible pencil on each wholesale cut. The seller must also collect from the purchaser the ration points and make reports to the local OPA office at the close of each month. This applies whether the meat is sold to a wholesaler, a storekeeper, or a consumer.

The number of head of livestock which a farmer will butcher, can slaughter, and sell depends upon the number of those animals he butchered and sold in 1941. A farmer who has no records in 1941 or did no selling during that year may slaughter and sell 3 animals in 1943, only one of which can be a beef animal. A slaughter permit is necessary in all cases, as is the collection of rationed points.

A farmer can produce and slaughter what meat he needs for his own slaughter without a slaughter permit. He is expected to stay within the limits of the point rationing system voluntarily. The farmer also can trade meat with another producer of food up to 400 pounds in one year. The County USDA War Boards have been given the responsibility of issuing slaughter permits to farmers and butchers.

Applications may be obtained at the War Board office in the court house. The purpose of this regulation is to keep the sale of meat in the regular trade channels in order that the point rationing system will affect all civilians alike, pointed out Mr. Lathrop. As some of the supplies of meat bypass the rationing program, then some other section of the country will not receive its pro rata share of the existing supplies.

HIGHWAYS WARTIME FIT

Despite one of the most severe road wrecking winters on record and the increasing shortage of maintenance workers Oregon's highways are in better shape than they have ever been.

HONEY CROP SHORT

There will be an unusual shortage in Oregon's honey crop reports A. B. Black, state apiary supervisor. The large commercial bee keepers have reduced their holdings from 30 to 50 per cent due to labor shortage. Winter kill and starvation have resulted in heavy mortality among bees. In addition to the effect on the honey crop the shortage of bees will be felt on all crops which require pollination.

PREDATORY BOUNTIES

In a recent opinion Attorney General Van Winkle ruled that county courts have the power to levy taxes for the payment of bounties on predatory animals and

to fix the amount of the bounties. In an opinion requested by Giles L. French, Moro, the attorney general ruled that rates prescribed by the legislature for publication of legal advertisements such as summonses, county financial reports and tax foreclosure notices, are mandatory on the printers and the public officials to whose duties they apply.

consisting of Sam H. Baker, chairman; Mrs. Louis Gerlinger and Allen Wilcoxson, serve on individual panels but in addition will continue to handle the various rationed items where no panels have been created as well as the general operation of the board.

The public will take up any problem directly with the panel handling the rationed items.

Beginning May 1 the business hours of the board will be changed as follows: 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. every day except Saturday and on Saturdays opened from 9:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.

In order to take care of those who cannot go to the board during these hours the board will remain open every Wednesday evening from 6:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. However practically all of the business on rationing can be handled by mail and that may often save the individual's time on account of the crowd that may be at the rationing board for service.

More women are urgently needed to fold dressings at the Odd Fellows hall on Wednesday afternoons. From ten to fifteen women has been the average attendance, but this group feels proud of the amount they have done. 10,632 dressings have been sent in to date with 3,030 sent in for April, with at least 6 more women from Kerby a third more could be made. These are hospital dressings folded from the thin gauze. Even the less nimble fingers can do two dozen an hour. A print dress, cotton head wrap is all you need. A light comfortable place to sit and pleasant conversation, a pattern to follow and pile of snow white gauze is furnished.
