"Where is all the money coming from to meet the 13 billion dollars of the Second War Loan goal?" is a question heard on many sides. It will come out of the 45-billion dollar surplus earnings of 1943, according to statistics reported by Treasury experts.

During 1941 personal savings of individuals amounted to 9 billion dollars. During 1942 this surplus or prospective savings will increase by 36 billion dollars over 1941 when consumer goods were easy to get.

Now that prices are high, thrifty people will make their goods last longer and place more money in War Bonds.

Bus Official Advises Against Vacation Travel

Repeating his advice to the traveling public not to do any non-essential traveling during the coming months, F. W. Ackerman, vice president of Pacific Greyhound lines, in a statement to the press advises people to stay at home this summer and spend the money they would use for a trip to buy additional war bonds.

Acknowledging that this is unusual advice coming from a company whose business is to promote travel, Mr. Ackerman pointed out that winning the war is far more vital to everybody than taking week-end or vacation trips.

Mr. Ackerman said that he fully agrees with the statement made by Mr. Eastman, director of the office of defense transportation, to the effect that there will be little room for vacation or pleasure travel this year, and added that buses are already crowded with military traffic war workers and other passengers whose business is important to the nation's welfare.

Stating that while many war workers and others would undoubtedly benefit from a short vacation, Mr. Ackerman believes that they should relax at home, or near home, rather than take long trips. They should travel only during the middle of the week, get travel information in advance, and carry as little baggage as possible. This cooperation, he said, will help relieve the nation's over-taxed transportation facilities which are so vital to the prosecution of the war.

FIRST CASUALTY FOR THIS VICINITY

Private First Class Laurel I. Bedingfield died January 3 last of wounds received in battle in New Guinea, a war department message advised his mother, Mrs. Jannie Bedingfield of Medford.

Pvt. Bedingfield was inducted into the army in April, 1941. He served at Ft. Lewis before being assigned to duty in the south Pacific area.

Besides his mother he is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Dolores Durkin of Talent; Miss Ruth Bedingfield of Prospect and Miss Wilda Bedingfield of Medford and

three brothers, Leroy Bedingfield in the navy; Clyde Bedingfield of Medford and Alfred Bedingfield of Selma.

JAP BOMBS OF 1943

This is No. 3 in a series of 5 consecutive daily articles on the bombs now in actual use by our enemies, and the way to handle them. The Oregon State Defense Council emphasizes the fact that there is no assurance that some other type of bomb may not be used in any attacks made on the Pacific Coast but those pictured and described here are the most recent types used by the Japs on other fronts.

50 Kilo Combination Incendiary and Explosive

This bomb weighing 110 pounds is approximately 30 inches in length including tail and is 8 inches in diameter. On impact it throws out 60 small metal containers with thermit filling and 6 larger tumbler-shaped fire pots containing magnesium type filler which is pre-ignited. Almost immediately after ejecting the incendiary units, a 12-pound charge of high explosive in the nose of the bomb is detonated.

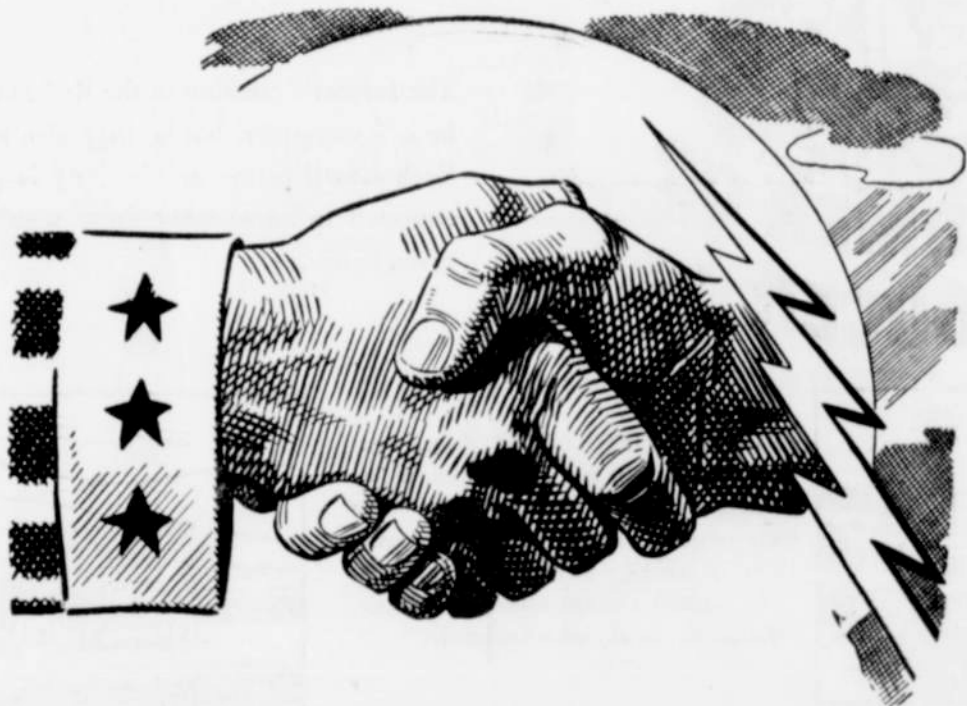
The purpose of this bomb is clear. First to scatter a large number of units consisting of magnesium and thermit capable of starting fires which will be followed immediately by the explosion of 12 pounds of TNT which will create a considerable amount of inflammable debris to provide fuel to feed the burning incendiaries. Water and lots of it, under pressure will be needed to combat this type of ammunition.
