LETTING THE FORESTS DOWN

Congress is slopping water over the edges of the boat in regard to tax measures, but has deliberately rocked the boat to perilous proportions in its regard to forest fire protection.

Last year congress appropriated enough money to carry on constructive measures to fight forest fires. This year—the year military experts say and believe Japan will attack the west coast, where nearly all of America's standing timber is growing—this year they have cut \$6,500,000 from the forest budget, cutting out nearly all fire protection measures.

Western congressmen should make an all-out appeal to the middle section and eastern members of congress for an all-out appeal to help the forests.

The eastern members of congress know very little of the west. They still believe Indians scamper all over the country and will scalp you if you don't watch out. Their imagination of the west coast is of the 1890 vintage, when the west was still a little wild and wooly, and they still believe that the garden spot of the universe is "where nobody lives and the dogs bark at strangers."

If there was ever need for a fund to fight forest fires, that need is this year, and congress deliberately cuts the appropriation.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC HELPS WAR LOAD

In 1942, the first year of the war, Southern Pacific carried a freight volume in ton miles 73 per cent greater than the previous all-time high of 1929. Passenger service also reached a new all-time high, being 84 per cent greater than the former peak year of 1920.

These and other interesting facts are contained in a booklet "Facts about the Southern Pacific company" which is just off the press.

During 1942 the company operated 6150 special trains for all branches of the armed forces, in addition to a substantial number of military cars handled in regular trains. The company's dining cars served meals at the rate of more than 12,000,000 a year.

More than 9000 former employees were in military service at the end of 1942. The company labored under a manpower shortage during the entire year and on February 1, 1943, was short approximately 10,000 men.

New locomotives and other rolling stock were added during 1942 and improvements were made to the physical plant to bring total

expenditures of this nature to more than \$100,000,000 in the past three years.

INCOME TAX TOTALS

More than 232,000 persons in Oregon paid income taxes totaling more than \$12,000,000 the records of the tax commission showed on May 1. Earl Fisher, income tax division commissioner, estimates the total collections for the year may reach or even exceed \$18,000,000 as compared to \$13,000,000 last year and \$8,000,000 collected in 1941.
