IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the Amended Complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, within ten days from the date of the service of this Summons upon you, if served within this County; or if served within any other County of this state, then within twenty days from the date of service of this Summons upon you; or if served by publication hereof, then on or before four weeks from the first publication of this Summons, which date of first publication is Thursday, May 13, 1943, and the last date of publication is Saturday, June 12, 1943. And if you fail to answer or otherwise appear, for want thereof, the Plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in the Complaint, to-wit: For a decree dissolving the bonds of matrimony now and heretofore existing between the Plaintiff and the Defendant and fully divorcing the Plaintiff from the Defendant, for equitable relief, and for costs in this suit. DAIRY CALVES IN DEMAND

The local office of the Farm Security Administration has received word from its Portland office that they now have orders for 1500 dairy calves from farmers in surplus feed areas of Oregon, Idaho, and Washington and can use even more heifers if they can be purchased.

This is a direct appeal to dairymen to save their heifer calves. Eventually those calves will add to our much needed milk supply. Not only does our country need all the milk than can be produced, but will need over a million dairy animals to re-stock Europe after the war. The British Purchasing Commission has already placed an

order for over a million dairy animals for delivery after the war. The farmers help is urgently requested as there are still many heifer calves from good cows being killed at birth or sold for veal because dairymen are producing at capacity of their farms and do not have feed or labor to raise their heifer calves.

The farmers of Josephine county have cooperated very well with the Dairy Animal Conservation Program and as a result the calves from Josephine county are in demand over the three states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho. At present the demand is greatest for dairy calves and heifers.

Prices paid for calves will vary according to age, breed, and production of the dams, but generally \$10 will be paid for 10 to 14 day old dairy calves, this includes milking shorthorns. Where production is over 380 pounds additional sums will be paid. If calves are over 14 days old they will be purchased on the basis of size and condition. There is a demand for Josephine and Jackson county dairy heifers from 6 months to 2 years old and top prices are paid for these heifers, about 10 per cent above local beef prices. All purchases will be made direct from the farmer and time and place of delivery for shipment will be made at time of purchase. This practice will apply to the purchase of calves as well as older heifers. It is the desire of the FSA to purchase only those calves or older heifers not needed by local dairymen or good dairy type animals that may be slaughtered. FROM THOSE MODEST BEGINNINGS, COASTAL AND INTERCOASTAL TRADE GREW STEADILY BY THE TIME OF OUR ENTRANCE INTO THIS WAR, MORE THAN HALF OUR TOTAL TONNAGE WAS DEVOTED EXCLUSIVELY TO THOSE OPERATIONS.

H-B Developing Scratch, as before. Gradually change from H-B Chick Starter to H-B Developing Mash at 7 weeks. 3/4 hour to 1 hour rest period before the evening feeding. Increase hopper space. Fresh water. Green feed. No. 3 granite grit in hoppers. Light feeding of oats in hopper at noon.
