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WAR TIME ROSE CITY

To those of you who have lived in Portland before this war, or who have visited the beautiful City of Roses, what a shock it must be for you to visit the city now—in its full dress effort for the war.

Portland was always noted for being one of the most conservative and individualistic cities in the United States, yet it was always substantial and a pleasant place to visit and live. Now it's a mad house, and you can spell it with capital letters and not overestimate it.

We lived in Portland 20 years and believed it one of the most wonderful cities on earth. We still believe that, but the influx of war workers—looking for the big money—has made the city a dumping

ground for every kind of nationality. Not that this isn't all right, but the lack of systematic rule for its citizens, to us at least, seems utterly lacking.

People roam the streets all night. Some are going to work and some are coming from work, and it looked to us like some were there just because they were there.

To go back to Portland now to live would be like going to a very strange place, with the exceptions of the streets and buildings—they are still there. But everything else has changed, even the stores. And it certainly profits one nothing to get "huffy" about anything, for the response back is anything but a kiss on the cheek. When you go to Portland now—take what you get, and take it with a smile and you will get much farther. Growl and you get a snarl back that says—"What the hell are you doing here anyway—Why don't you go back where you came from."

Portland, the Beautiful Rose City, is no more like Portland 10 years ago than Cave Junction was before the white man came. Yet the roses smell just as sweet. War can certainly shove a beautiful city around.
