### MORE SUMMER EGGS LAID IF HENS FED MORE MASH, WATER

More laying mash and less scratch grain are needed by hens to keep up maximum egg production through the summer months says Noel N. Bennion, extension specialist in poultry husbandry at Oregon State college. After the spring flush, egg prices usually increase, hence is it most desirable to obtain all production possible during the hot months.

Increased consumption of a well balanced laying mash may be obtained by cutting down on the scratch grain feed while keeping a fresh supply of the mash before the birds at all times, says Bennion. The proteins, vitamins and minerals in the mash stimulate egg production, while the scratch

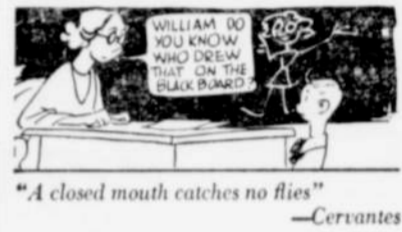
