Congressional district who wish to make a try for the appointment should write me immediately, stating their desire to do so. I am anxious to have as many as possible take the examination. The Civil Service examination will be held at 9:00 A. M., July 31, 1943, at the post offices in Eugene, Marshfield, Medford and Roseburg. Examinations for boys already in the armed forces—no matter where they may now be stationed—will be arranged through their commanding officers. I suggest that parents or friends of boys, who might wish to try for this Annapolis appointment, send me the names and present addresses of such boys immediately—surely before July 15 (use air mail, please)—and I will see that the boys are given the competitive examination. To be eligible, boys must be 17 years of age on or before April 1, 1944, and not older than 21 as of that date. Marriage makes a boy ineligible.
